

The Patriot on the "Unexpected Change."

THE unblushing impudence of the Patriot's prate about "servile supporters" will be recognized by all who know that in this Province the once honored name of Patriot has become a synonym for truckling servility. As one of our most recent correspondents remarks, "the Patriot defends his Party whether right or wrong." So constantly, invariably and regardlessly of truth or principle has the Patriot truckled to its Party, that its files from year to year exhibit a mass of inconsistencies, the bulk of which is second to that shown by the Halifax Chronicle only because the Chronicle is the older paper of the two. But for its audacity of statement and its facility of vituperation the Patriot would be as utterly contemptible—as the New Era.

With such a character as this the Patriot attacks our representatives for having hitherto given the present Government an unwavering support. If it were not instinct with turpitude it would, instead, have pleaded this unwavering support as one reason why the Government should, with alacrity, accede to the demand of our representatives for the recognition of an undoubted right which has hitherto been denied this Province by both parties. But it shuns a course which might bring it into unison with the EXAMINER, just as naturally as the evil shun the good, or the servile, the independent.

The Patriot makes light of the claim of the Island to equality of right in the appointment and promotion of Railway and Civil Service officials. It says we "make much ado about nothing." Now, John Stewart Mill says that the first condition necessary to a federation such as that of the Dominion of Canada, "a sufficient amount of mutual sympathy among the populations." But is it possible to have this, when one of the populations is placed under a disability by the General Government, because it is small and politically weak? Mill goes on to say that "the sympathies available for the purpose of a Federation are those of race, language, religion, and above all of political institutions as conducting most to a feeling of identity of political interest." But how can there be "identity of political interest," when the chief places of one of the "political institutions," are practically closed to one of the members of the Federation? Lord Brougham says "it is of the essence of this proper Federal Union that its different members should have equal rights and that all should bear a part in the central administration." We might quote many other authors to show that this right to equality which we have been preferring is, so far from being a matter of no account, as the Patriot says it is, that its recognition by the General Government is considered to be absolutely necessary to the success of a union such as that of this Province with Canada.

The Patriot says it has no sympathy with this "foreign cry." Neither has the EXAMINER. But the EXAMINER has sympathy with efficient subordinate officials, who, solely because they happen to be Islanders, or happen to be stationed in the Island, are proscribed from the higher offices of both this and the other Provinces, and are condemned to labor on without hope or prospect of promotion. The Patriot also says that "no Islander has received the training necessary to make him an efficient Superintendent." Now, it will be remembered that a few years ago, a conductor on the Island Railway—Mr. E. H. Brennan—resigned, and left for a Province in which ability is recognized; that, in a comparatively short space of time he worked his way up till he became Superintendent of a railway as difficult to manage as the Island Railway is, and that he has proved so efficient and successful in his office that he is now in the receipt of a handsome salary. Had Mr. Brennan remained in the Island he would now be in precisely the same position as Messrs. Stronach, Williams, Hodgson, McGowan, Kelly and many others—some of them men of marked natural ability—all of them well-trained, efficient officials—who have remained in the employ of the Island Railway from the beginning,—without a hope or prospect of promotion to higher positions, either on the Island or on the mainland. We are inclined to think that the Patriot holds Island ability much too cheaply. But we are glad to see that it is willing to admit the ability of Messrs. Williams and Stronach; and we have only to remark that had either of these gentlemen been appointed Superintendent, or been promoted according to their deserts, there would now be a chance for subordinate officials who deserve promotion—and some hope in the future.

When Lord Dufferin visited us he congratulated the Island, because he said a larger and more important field would be open to the talents and abilities of our public men—including of course, our public officials; and, when he was in British Columbia, dealing with a grievance of the people of that Province, he said: "Woe betide the Government or statesmen who, because its inhabitants are few in number and politically of small account, should disregard the wishes or carelessly dismiss the representations, however bluff, boisterous or downright, of the feeblest or our distant Colonies."

In concluding this article, we cannot, perhaps, do better than commend these words of Lord Dufferin to the consideration of Sir Charles Tupper.

Supreme Court.

Before the Chief Justice and Judge Peters. James Larkin vs. William C. Montgomery and others.—This case was tried at Summerside in October, and resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff. At the trial a motion was made by the defendants' attorney for a nonsuit on several grounds. The points were reserved by Judge Peters, the presiding judge, and leave reserved to move again. Accordingly a motion was made on Saturday by Mr. Hodgson, Q.C., on behalf of the defendants' to have the verdict set aside and instead thereof a nonsuit entered on the grounds stated at the trial, and also that the verdict was contrary to evidence. The Court granted a rule nisi on all the grounds.

The Proper Way to Advertise.

Merchants, traders and manufacturers in this city should follow the example of successful business men in the West and across the line by resorting to the newspapers, especially during the approaching festive season, as the means best adapted to bring their wares before the public. No medium can be better than a really good newspaper. Catch-penny devices, which are transitory in their character, and only reach a limited number of persons at best, should be avoided. Money is only wasted in their use. Business men should stick to the newspapers if they hope to instruct the public where to buy seasonable goods, and where to obtain genuine bargains. A. T. Stewart, of New York, always sought to reach the public through the newspapers when he had anything really seasonable and useful to offer for sale. So do Clafin & Co., of the same city to this day; and so do Jordan & Marsh, of Boston, J. D. Macdonald, of Toronto, and all the really live business men of Toronto, and Montreal. None of these men are deluded by the many temporary advertising humbugs of the day. A whole page is often chosen by some of them to attract attention, and the money which the space costs is considered an expenditure well made and sure to yield handsome returns.—St. John News.
