Intellectual Progress.

Intellectual progress in the north-west is keeping pace with material advancement. The report of the superintendent of the Protestant schools of Manitoba for 1883 furnishes us with some interesting figures in relation thereto. In 1871 there were 16 schools with an attendance of 816; in 1878 50 schools, and an attendance of 2,670, while 1883 the schools numbered 271, and the total attendance arose to 10,831. The legislative grant for 1883 was \$33,153, and \$176,016 were received from the issue of debentures, and expended on school houses. Collegiate departments have been established at Winnipeg, Brandon and Portage La Prairie, which are fairly well patronized, and form a connecting link between the common schools and the university. Teachers appear to be well paid, the average salary in Winnipeg being \$1,013 for men, and \$553 for female teachers; in Brandon \$1,000, \$413, and in Rapid City \$925 and \$370 respectively. The school property in Winnipeg is valued at \$228,733. The showing of the Manitoba schools is a creditable one. Sparseness of settlement in the rural districts offers a present difficulty which increasing immigration will soon remove.
