

Reds Take Over NL Lead; Yanks Win, Indians Lose

 Cincinnati's robust Reds edged into the National League lead with an eighth-inning rally that swept a four-game series from Philadelphia 8-5 Thursday. While the Pittsburgh Pirates dropped to third as the Chicago Cubs made off with the rubber game in their three-game set 5-2.

Cincinnati in the lead this far into the season for the first time in 12 years, used Smokey Burgess' fourth homer to lead off the three-run eighth that gave the Reds their first lead in the game. It also provided a 13-percentage-point edge over the idle runner St. Louis Cardinals.

Bob Buhl beat Brooklyn for the third time this season as the Milwaukee Braves ended a three-game losing streak and junked the Dodgers' four-game winning string 4-1 in the only other NL game scheduled.

TURLEY IN WIN
 In the American, Bob Turley four-hit Kansas City while Yogi Berra smacked his fourth homer in four games and Hank Bauer powered his 13th for a 9-1 New York victory. The Indians open a three-game stay at Yankee Stadium today.

Chicago's third place White Sox beat Washington 7-5 and Boston handed Detroit a second straight

defeat, after the Tigers had won seven in a row, 6-5 in 10 innings. Joe Nuxhall, fourth of five Red Sox pitchers, won his second in three days with a scoreless eighth. The Phils scored three in the first off starter Hal Jeffcoat, then took a 5-3 lead in the fifth. Reliever Bob Miller was the loser.

MIKSIS HOMERS
 Eddie Miksis homered, tripled and had two singles for the Cubs, who popped out of the cellar. Walt Moryn also homered as the Cubs collected 11 hits to beat Elroy Face, who had won four of five. Bob Rush won his fifth, fanning seven in a six-hitter.

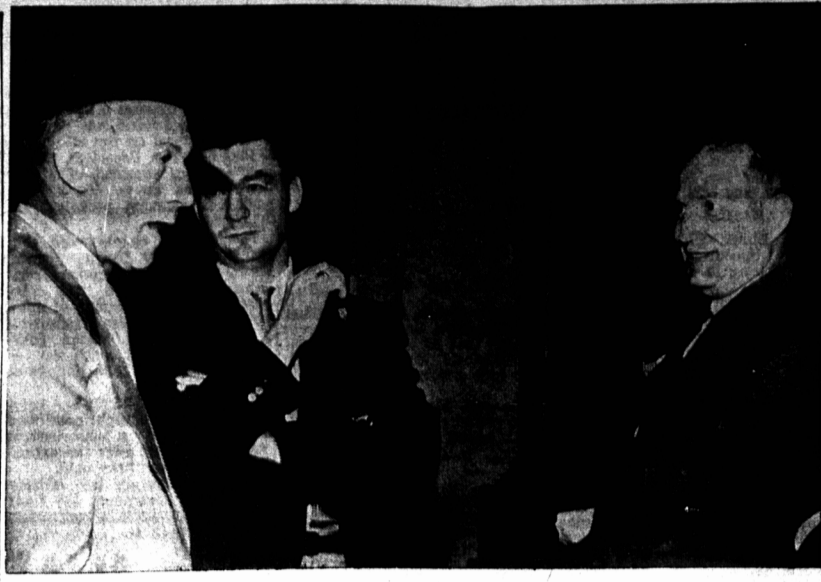
The Braves smacked 10 hits off starter Carl Erskine and two relievers while Buhl won his fifth with a four-hitter. Erskine, losing his fifth, hasn't won since his May 12 no-hitter.

Berra had two other hits with his 16th homer, scored twice and drove in two runs while Mickey Mantle had two for four, upping his AL leading average to .403. The A's didn't use their shift on Berra since the switch-hitting slugger was batting right-handed against loser Alex Kellner and relievers Bobby Shantz and Tom Lasorda, all southpaws.

FIVE-HITTER
 Bill Wight and reliever George Zuverink held the Indians to five hits as the Birds beat Cleveland for only the second time this season.

Ted Lepcio's double off reliever Al Aber beat the Tigers, who blew a 4-1 lead. Frank Sullivan won his fourth for the Boston—who had 18 hits but left 17 men stranded.

Triplets by Nellis Fox and Dave Philley and follow-up sacrifice flies by Minnie Minoso and Larry Doby broke up a tie game for the White Sox in the ninth. Howie Pollet won in relief. Pete Ramos lost it.

TIPS ON GOLFING

Practice Starting Position

A big, yes, very big, item in the routine of the money player is the starting position for a shot. Most of the pros, players or teachers seem to place this bit of technique on the basis of aiming. As a result, all sorts of measures are advocated and used. These invariably place the player in a position from which he has to steer the shot or depart from the simple procedure of swinging the club in order to make some compensation during his backswing or downswing.

For these reasons I strongly object to the measure that places aiming above swinging. I maintain that the best direction in all shots, as well as efficiency in swinging is had when you set yourself up for swinging. This isn't hard to do when you accept and keep uppermost in your mind the principle of it. Remember the main object is to get yourself lined up so that in swinging the club you will strike the ball properly to send it in the desired direction.

It's easy to tell if you are setting yourself for steering or swinging. One essential is enough to check on. This is the position of your arms in relation to your body.

Note, in the accompanying illustration that the upper arms are close to the body when first gripping the club and all through the placing of the feet.

After placing your hands on the club, with the clubhead remaining on the ground in its natural position, you should allow the club to be lifted off the ground only by raising your body to a more erect position.

Then in placing the clubhead to the ball your arms should still be held close to your body until your feet are properly arranged.

This routine should be practiced without making a swing, even a waggle, until you can complete it without changing the position of your arms.

Patterson 2-1 Favorite To Whip Jackson Tonight

NEW YORK (AP)—Floyd Patterson, 21-year-old former Olympic champion, is a 2-to-1 favorite to pass his most important test tonight by taming Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson in a 12-round heavyweight elimination bout at Madison Square Garden.

The winner of this match probably will advance to a September match with Archie Moore, the light heavyweight king, for the heavyweight title recently vacated by Rocky Marciano.

Although boxing purists quake at the Hurricane's flapping unorthodox tactics and belittle his ability, "the animal" is rated No. 2 in the division in the latest ring ratings. Patterson, virtually untested against big league opposition, is listed fourth in the class. Jackson has gained support among some boxing men on his stamina and inexhaustible energy. The Hurricane has beaten Ezzard

Charles, the ex-champ, twice and earned a decision over Bob Baker, highly ranked contender in one of his two bouts this year. His complete record is 27-4-1 with 13 knockouts.

Patterson has lost only once in 30 starts, dropping a disputed decision to Joey Maxin, former light heavy champ, in an eight-rounder two years ago.
