

REPEAL!—A Repeal Meeting was held at the House of Mr. Martin Kehoe, Tryon, on the 20th ult. Mr. John Slattery, of the Repeal Association of Charlottetown, was called by acclamation to the chair, and addressed the meeting at great length. Mr. Thomas Donahoe was appointed Secretary to the meeting. The usual Resolutions were put and carried unanimously. The Chairman, amidst loud cheers, announced the amount of Repeal Rent to be £3 14s. 3d. after which, the assemblage dispersed, having previously given three cheers for Queen Victoria, three for O'Connell, and three for Tom Steele, the Head Pacifier of all Ireland. The appointment of the following persons, who had been nominated Repeal Wardens for this district at the meeting at Barrett's, on the 21st of August, was confirmed at this meeting, viz:—Martin Kehoe, Michael Deegan James Perkins.

A Repeal meeting, which was very numerous and respectively attended, was held at the house of Mr. John Gillis, Grand River, on the 30th ult. Mr. Mark Foran was called to the chair, and Mr. Peter Brennan appointed Secretary to the meeting. Mr. Slattery, from the Charlottetown Association, attended, and addressed the meeting with his usual eloquence and ability. A series of Resolutions—among which was the following—was put from the chair, and carried unanimously:

Resolved, That being firmly attached to our beloved and gracious Sovereign Queen Victoria, and the principles of the constitution, we hereby declare our fixed determination to persevere in aiding the people of Ireland to procure the restoration of their own Parliament, as we are convinced that it is the only means of preserving the connection which binds Ireland to the British Crown.

The majority of the meeting, which was composed of Scotch Highlanders, were most enthusiastic in their wishes for the success of the Repealers of Ireland and their great leader O'Connell. The following persons were appointed Repeal Wardens: Messrs. Donald Macdonald, Head R. W., Secretary and Treasurer; John Macnalley, John Ains, John Gillis, Roderick Gillis, Paul Perry, Egmont Bay.

The chairman, amidst loud applause, announced the Repeal Rent for the evening to amount to £5 9s. 3d. Upon motion of Mr. Slattery, the thanks of the meeting were voted to Mr. Mark Foran, for his able conduct in the chair. Mr. Slattery then called for three cheers for the Hon. Donald Macdonald, of Tracadie, M. L. C., and the generous, warm-hearted Highlanders of Prince Edward Island, which call was loudly and unanimously responded to by the assembled crowd. The meeting was adjourned, sine die, after having given three cheers for the Queen, Old Ireland and O'Connell

Correspondence.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE COLONIAL HERALD.

"Can such things be, And pass us like a summer's cloud, Without our special wonder?"

Sir: With reference to your correspondent's letter on "Church Abuses," which appeared in your independent paper of the 2d inst., calling upon your subscribers to furnish some additional light as to the nature and truth of various rumours that have been in circulation during the last five or six years, I cannot permit this subject to pass without expressing my cordial acquiescence in any measure that may tend to bring forward a full investigation of its merits. I have to observe, that the writer labours under a misconception, as relates to the amount produced by the sale of the Glebe Lands, as well as regards its appropriation—the sum total being nearly £4,000, which is supposed to have been paid into the Treasury.

The portion derived from the sale of the Church Lands was rather more than £3,000, and was directed by the Home Government to be applied to Education, in connexion with the Church of England; but the proceeds obtained from the sale of the school reserved lands were to be devoted to general education. So far, the former may fairly be termed a Church Fund. It appears that the ostensible object of the writer is to procure an insight into the mysterious management of these funds. I am very apprehensive he will find some difficulty in obtaining many particulars so essential to this end, as those persons who profess to be well acquainted with the correctness of the reports alluded to do not, unfortunately, possess sufficient nerve and moral courage to appear boldly before the public, and expose all the parties implicated in this transaction, but prefer sheltering themselves under a pledge of secrecy, when divulging circumstances that would be discredit to the characters of the humblest person in this Island. These statements have at length called forth a series of startling queries, and it behoves us all to be united and firm in requiring an ample investigation into this important subject, nor to rest satisfied without receiving a reply to each of the queries evidently submitted for our guidance.

What a lamentable reflection, to find all parties so indifferent to the welfare of the lower classes of society—whether it be those whose conduct has called forth so much censure for such a length of time, and who have, in some measure, confirmed these unpleasant rumours by omitting any explanation to clear their characters,—the community who have made no efforts to bring to light the abuse,—or the clergy throughout the Island, who are bound, not only to preach the Gospel, but to uphold all these principles of right and justice so strongly enforced by its Divine Founder! How much have the respectable portion of the community to answer for, in not having acquainted themselves with the state of these funds! All Trust Accounts are, or ought to be, closed annually, and signed by the Trustees—the nature of the investments and security ought to be clear and explicit. Why are not their Accounts published, by which the truth or falsehood of these rumours might at once have been ascertained? They were bound, by every motive both of religion and morality, to examine into and oppose to the uttermost any such abuses; but if they were induced to neglect their duty from indolence, fear or reluctance, they will be deemed accessory to the injustice done to the public, and it will be in vain to excuse themselves on the plea of not being fully acquainted with the matter—that it was none of their affair—or that they knew not how to prevent it. All true Christians will see through such lukewarmness, and learn how to appreciate them as friends or supporters of a sound religious education for the rising generation.

This subject has been fully brought before the public. The truth of the rumours and surmises reflecting on the conduct of those who are or ought to be accountable for the safe keeping and just management of this fund, will now no doubt be ascertained.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE COLONIAL HERALD.

Sir:—Having read in your valuable Journal of the 2d Sept., an article entitled CHURCH ABUSES, which has caused some sensation in our small community, I feel it my duty to express my hope that all Protestants will cordially unite towards obtaining a full examination as to the system adopted with regard to the Church and School funds. I am fully sensible that many injurious rumours have been in circulation for a length of time, which, if true, are prejudicial to the character of many of the inhabitants, for not remedying such evils, equally with those who are more directly concerned in the matter. We have now no excuse; we must go forward, or sink in the estimation of our neighbours. There is little reason to doubt that a favored few have been accommodated to a large extent—something like £1600; and it is conjectured that this sum constitutes a floating capital, and is considered to be under the direction of a firm, laughably, though not inaptly, designated Messrs. Cry and Co., and that this partnership is rather a singular one, the members being privileged to act independently, to the extent of their respective loans. These funds are said to be applied partly to the encouragement of John Barbicorm—some to trade—and the rest to shipping. Whatever profit or pleasure they may each derive from such traffic, to the poor it is a source of much grief. With a little perseverance, assisted by this curious clue, some chance is afforded to discover those who are taking so prominent a part in this

unjust transaction. Such it must be, as it is positively asserted that a responsible trust has not been formed, nor the money or securities lodged in the Treasury. In the meantime, I recommend those concerned in this affair to visit our circular Market-house, and quietly glance their eyes upwards, till they meet with an admonition.

Sir; I perfectly coincide with parts of the communication of VERITAS, which appeared in your paper of the 29th ult. The writer seems to be impartial. I am not prepared to say whether the *Novascotian* is a "subject" which the *Islander* ought to consider beneath his consideration, for I have not an opportunity of perusing the *Novascotian*; but I am of opinion that the *Islander's* editorials,—which are conceived in servility to the ruling aristocracy of this colony, and distinguished only by a culpable exaggeration of the virtue of our officials, and by scurrilous invective against those who, from the principle of philanthropy, devote their time and their talents in order to effect an amelioration of the wretched condition of many of the settlers of this Island,—ought to be deemed unworthy of allusion or comment by an editor of any respectable paper; and I am happy to observe, Sir, that you possess the good sense and discretion to disregard his ribaldry against yourself, which shows him to be, not only "irritable and unregenerate," but vindictive and depraved. However, the circulation of the *Islander* is but comparatively limited; and its existence, it is apprehended, will soon be altogether dependent on the "family compact" and their minions, whose interests are notoriously inimical to the general welfare, but which the *Islander* endeavours to advocate. Let them, then, provided for their creatures. Why should the country be galled to support a periodical which is so evidently an obstruction to its common weal? Many who have been influenced to become subscribers to the *Islander* by the deceiving Prospectus and duplicity of its publisher—who declared, on soliciting supporters, previous to its publication, that it would be a liberal paper—have withdrawn; and I know scores more that are determined to follow their example. Mr. Editor, tyranny continues to triumph. But it is a consolation to know that the people are becoming energetic, and will not be intimidated from seeking their rights by the poisonous ebullitions of the hydra-headed monster.
