Top Price Winners
At Holstein Sale

R.A. Proffitt, Freetown, P.E.I.,
who sold a bred heifer to H.L.
Gulbert, Vercheres, Que., for \$1,000,
and Colby C. Lewis, Freetown, with
the sale of a bred heifer to Geo. A.
Rutt, Ephraim, Pa., for \$825, were
among the Maritime Holstein
breeders receiving top prices at
the All-Canadian Holstein Sale
held in Toronto.
Clearwater Farm, East Bathurst,
N.B. received \$1,500 from W.S.
Hall, Oakville, Ont., for a three
year old heifer. This animal was
classified as "very good" in Selec-
tive Registration as a two-year-old
and had a two-year-old production
record of 781 lbs. fat from 20845 lbs.
of milk in 365 days. Clearwater
Farm also sold a bred heifer for
\$825.
The average of \$1,173 on 68 head
compared with \$1,072 a year ago.
Bulls sold exceptionally well, the
seven offered averaging \$3,800. Top
price was \$9,100 paid by the Oxford
Holstein Breeders Association,
Woodstock, Ont. to J.J.E. Mc-
Cague, Alliston, for the seven

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Commons Begins
Study of New
Rates Bill

OTTAWA, Oct. 26 —(CP)—
The Commons today embarked on
a study of government legislation
empowering the Board of Trans-
port Commissioners to work a
fundamental change in the coun-
try's railway transportation policy
—the long-awaited equaliza-
tion of freight rates.
The chamber opened second
reading of the legislation, which
implements some recommenda-
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on Transportation, preparatory
to sending it to a special com-
mittee for detailed examination.
Opposition members generally
welcomed the legislation—and its
primary aim—though some Mar-
itime representatives in their
ranks expressed fear the equaliza-
tion would eliminate the tradi-
tionally low rates granted years
ago to the Atlantic provinces.
Transport Minister Chevrier,
piloting the legislation, has given
assurance that it won't.
