

Milton And Cornwall Meet In Queens County Intermediate B Finals

The Milton Hornets and the Cornwall Meteors will meet in the Queens County Intermediate B hockey finals this week as a result of their victories at the Forum on Saturday night before a crowd of 1050 fans.

The Hornets eliminated the Parkdale Bombers in a game which failed to go regulation time on account of a wild and tempestuous donnybrook late in the third period. At the time Milton were leading 4-2 and accordingly won the round 12-8.

The Cornwall Meteors eliminated the Nine Mile Creek Bulldogs by defeating the Nine Mile Creek players 6-4. They won the two game, total goal series 15-12.

There were three minutes left in the Milton-Parkdale game when the donnybrook commenced. The majority of players on both teams participated. Following ten minutes of fighting and brawling the referees called the game.
