### Montreal-Based Labor Union Suggests Ties With Congress

**MONTREAL (CP)**—The executive of the Montreal-based Confederation of National Trade Unions has suggested that its 200,000 members should seek closer ties with its long-time rival, the Canadian Labor Congress.  
 A 200-page report presented to 1,200 delegates attending the CNTU's 42nd biennial convention by Robert Sauve, national secretary, says that despite distinct differences of views separating the two organizations, closer ties must be established for the sake of labor solidarity. It is a plea that may not sound very convincing to the CLC, which represents three-quarters of union members across Canada, but has been expressing sharp irritation lately with raiding attempts made on its unions by the smaller body.  
 Mr. Sauve told the delegates the CLC has so far ignored a previous plea for greater co-operation contained in a letter sent to congress president Claude Jodoin over a year ago suggesting measures be taken to prevent further inter-union conflict.  
 Since then the CLC has complained about CNTU raiding in several areas.  
**MOVES OUTSIDE QUEBEC**  
 Yet the CNTU, which has doubled its membership in the last six years and has begun organizing outside Quebec in Ontario and Newfoundland, argues in the report that the two bodies must come to terms or face "the destruction of unionism" in Canada.  
 "The time has come for unity among these two great movements," Mr. Sauve said in his outline of report.  
 The national secretary's presentation was one of several briefs presented to a serious audience for membership consideration since the convention opened Sunday.  
 It combined with the tone-setting report presented at the opening by national president Marcel Pepin urging CNTU members to fight for a stronger voice in national affairs and democratic worker participation at all government levels.  
 But Mr. Sauve's report Monday went beyond national considerations in asking that the federal government approve a CNTU request made earlier this year that the organization be given the right to appoint delegates to international labor conferences.

### SUPPORTS POLICIES

The report said the CNTU supports the position taken by the Canadian government on the Rhodesia and South Africa questions and its decision to work with other nations in hopes of moderating both discriminatory regimes.  
 But it attacked Canada's support for United States military intervention in Viet Nam.  
 "Military escalation in this east Asian country is menacing the peace of the world," the report said.  
 It also expressed disappointment in Canada's recent negative vote on the question of the recognition of continental China by the United Nations.  
 Mr. Sauve asked the delegates to bring forth resolutions later in the week condemning the use of court injunctions to limit picketing during strikes. He said such injunctions are being used irresponsibly by courts which are really tools of business.  
 The national secretary also recommended that provincial minimum salaries be raised immediately to a minimum of \$1.00 an hour and as soon as possible after that to \$1.25 an hour or equal to the federal minimum.

**TORONTO (CP)** - An eight-year-old girl has been awarded \$2,000 damages because of the upward-creeping trend in miniskirts threatening to create "dear knows what effects" from a jagged scar on her knee.  
 Mary Dervipies of Toronto was injured three years ago when hit by a car in front of her home. F. G. J. McDonough, county court judge, found her 20-per-cent negligent and motorist George Beard of Pickering Township 80-per-cent negligent.  
 The judge said that because "skirts are getting higher the knee scar might affect the girl's future."

## UNB Professor Planning To Bug Canadian Mining

**VANCOUVER (CP)** - Professor Charles L. Emery is out to bug the Canadian mining industry.  
 With real bugs.  
 Dr. Emery is head of the mineral engineering department in the faculty of applied science at the University of British Columbia. He is also president of Bio-Metals Corp. in Vancouver.  
 The internationally known mining researcher and consultant, one of his special projects has been to find a method of producing pure metals by bacterial leaching, using bacteria such as thiobacillus thiooxidans and thiobacillus ferrooxidans to chew the metal out of the rock far underground.  
 It is a process which could revolutionize the mining industry, with no mines as they are now known - no crushers, no concentrators and no refineries.  
 Dr. Emery is confident he and his staff are close to success.  
 "It's working very nicely at Highland Valley," he said Tuesday. "We're going into commercial production."  
 The first shipment of copper - not concentrate but the pure metal - from the experimental Skenema plant (can you call it a mine?) is expected "before the new year."  
 The Skenema property is leased to Dr. Emery's group by Skenema Consolidated Ltd., which will share in any profits.  
 Dr. Emery's staff is also working on two properties near Princeton. A pilot mill is being installed on one and the other is being developed as a bulk producer.  
 A second Highland Valley operation, Haricho Mines, has recently signed a contract with Bio-Metals Corp. to bacterial leach copper sulphide into copper sulphate which is pumped to the surface as a liquid.  
 Add iron to the solution and the copper can be extracted from the liquid as a pure form. The liquid can be broken down and the iron re-used. The rock underground is left porous, appearing like a good cheese. "The rock itself is left in the ground."  
 The chemical plant that Bio-Metals built last summer in Highland Valley sparked a number of breakthroughs, Dr. Emery said.  
 It enabled his staff, through experiments to solve problems of oxidizing the ore with various kinds of bacteria, finding the best type and amount of nutrients for them, combining the types of bacteria to be used in that location and speeding up the time needed for the process.  
 With commercial production in the offing, Dr. Emery said initial capacity will be "one or two tons a day."  
 This will be pure copper, produced on site without need of a smelter.  
 "But we're already looking forward to a somewhat enlarged operation."
