A Collision at Sea.

The Captain and Crew Drowned.

HALIFAX, June 24.

The ship Fred B. Taylor, of Yarmouth, was run down on Saturday and sunk 300 miles off Sandy Hook. Captain Huriburt and crew of 22 men went down with her. All hands are supposed to have been lost. The ship was on the voyage from Havre to New York in ballast. Captain Huriburt was a native of Yarmouth and was married. The other officers and crew are believed to be foreigners. William Law, Yarmouth, is managing owner.

STRIKE IMMINENT.

Fifteen Hundred Men Discharged.

NEW YORK, June 24.

All the house-smiths employed in this city in connection with the iron league were paid off in full on Saturday and ordered to apply as new men on Monday in case they want work. Employers have been endeavoring for the past week to ascertain what number of their employees belong to the House Smiths' Union, but did not succeed very well, and the wholesale discharge of all House Smiths' employees had to be resorted to. The number of men discharged was 1500. If they apply and are refused work it is stated that the Knights of Labor will order a strike in all buildings with which any firms of the iron league are connected. This will involve a strike affecting 50,000 men.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, June 24.

The inland revenue division at Halifax has been raised from third-class to second-class. The volume of business during the past three years had justified reclassification.

The Grigs had arranged to present address to Bob Watson on his retirement from Parliament and the acceptance of a portfolio in the Greenway Government. Laurier, Cartwright and about thirty English-speaking signed an address, but French Grigs refused point blank, owing to the stand of the Greenway Government on the land and school questions. The address was accordingly torn up.

Collectors of Customs have been notified that they need not collect heretofore immigration statistics which have annually accompanied each entry of sailors' effects.

For "Luck"

LONDON, June 27.

While Gladstone was driving on Saturday to address a meeting at Chester, a woman threw a piece of hard ginger bread, which struck Gladstone on the nose, bruising that member and causing it to bleed slightly. His left eye assumed to be affected and inflamed after the meeting and was in such a condition that it had to be bandaged. He will have to remain in a dark room for a few days. It is stated the woman who threw the missile at him, said it was for "luck."
