

# Montreal Requests Report On Clash With Strikers

MONTREAL (CP) — The city executive committee asked Police Director J. Albert Langlois Tuesday to make a full, written report before Friday on Monday's clash between police and striking CBC Montreal employees and their sympathizers.

The police director said Tuesday he had a secret report that striking employees and their sympathizers had planned to seize the Radio Canada building in midtown Montreal if talks between the strikers and the publicly-owned corporation broke down.

Mr. Langlois spoke of the report when he reported verbally to the executive committee on the stormy, hour-long demonstration Monday which culminated in the arrest of 28 CBC employees and a magazine photographer near the CBC building.

Those arrested and charged included labor leaders, actresses and other television personalities. All pleaded not guilty in court Tuesday and were released on bail. They were ordered to appear for preliminary hearing March 15.

The clash between strikers and police began Dec. 29, when 74 French-language television producers walked out to back demands for recognition of their Association des Realisateurs as a bargaining agent.

Monday's violence followed a meeting of striking producers and sympathizers attended by an estimated 2,000 persons who endorsed the producers' action in breaking off negotiations with the CBC. It broke out when those attending the mass session lined up for a one-mile march to the Radio Canada building on Dorchester Boulevard where they said they planned to sing O Canada.

The police director told the executive committee he had the secret report since Feb. 19 "and no other step could have been taken yesterday in view of the situation which was developing."

**LIES, SAYS MARCHAND**

Jean Marchand, secretary-general of the Canadian and Catholic Confederation of Labor which has been supporting the strikers, described Mr. Langlois' report as a "bundle of lies."

"We find it difficult to believe that Mr. Langlois is as stupid as he appears to be to admit in public that words expressed in a mass meeting by a solitary and anti-file trade unionist constitute a plot to invade the CBC building," a C.C.C.L. spokesman said a statement issued Monday night.

## Hoffa Blasts Smallwood

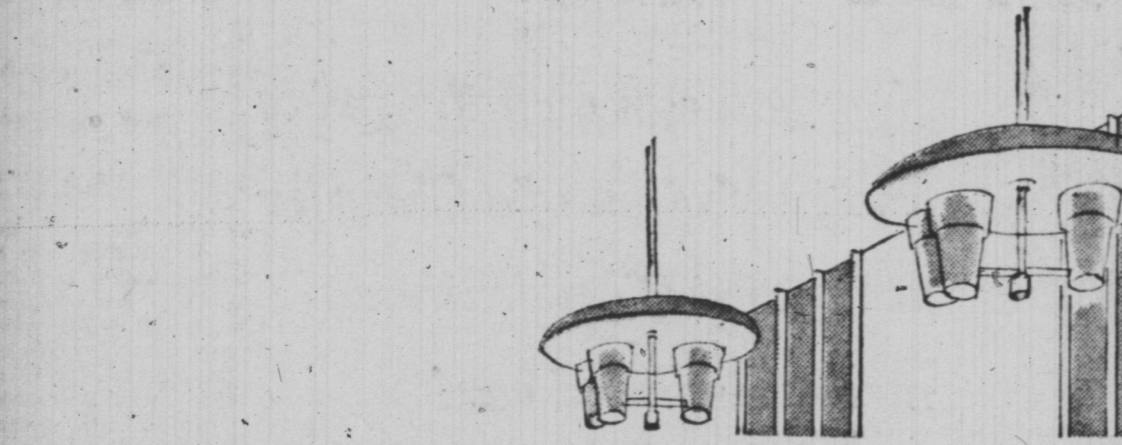

"We're surprised that such a thing could happen in Canada under the laws you have in your country," Mr. Hoffa said in a telephone interview from Washington.

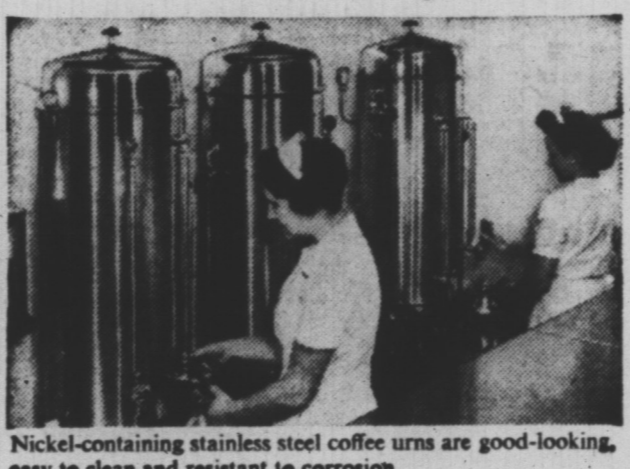

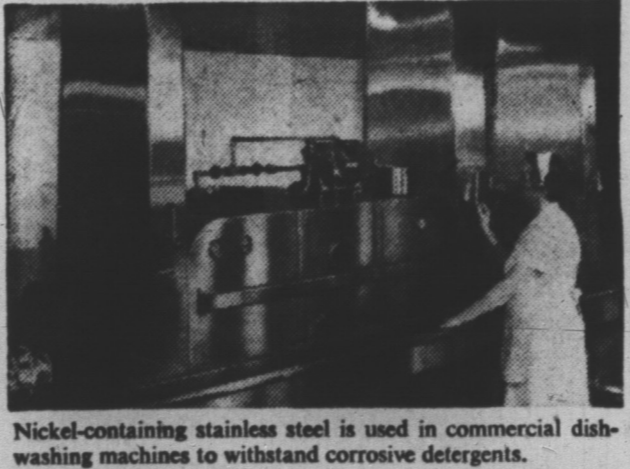
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
