

Evidence Heard On Theft Charge

SUMMERSIDE - The case of Urie Mathews Gallant, St. John, N.B., was heard before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Magistrate's court yesterday. Gallant had earlier pleaded not guilty to a charge of unlawful possession of a power drill, property of Tanton's Accessories, Charlottetown.

First witness called this morning was Roger William Tanton, Charlottetown, a clerk at Tanton's Accessories. He told of receiving the electric drill from West electric tools August 14, 1961, with accompanying invoice for the drill. Retail value of the drill was \$50.

Witness said Feb. 1, 1963, was the last time he saw the drill. He stated that the drill on exhibit in court was similar to the one in their store. Second witness was Cst. Charles Reed, Charlottetown police force. Cst. Reed testified that he had been contacted by Cpl. MacDonald of the RCMP in Bordonia and as a result Feb. 15, 1963, he and Cst. Reed were in Charlottetown to determine the possible retail value of the power drill in question.

Weston Buys French Chain

LONDON (CP) - Garfield Weston, the Canadian grocery millionaire, was reported Tuesday to have bought a majority stake in a chain of 70 French supermarkets. Reports appearing in the French press say Weston's £22,000,000 English company, Associated British Foods, carried out the deal quietly through subsidiaries on the continent. A spokesman for Weston would neither confirm nor deny the report. But in December Weston told a shareholders' meeting that he was hoping to take over a big grocery chain in France and had President Charles de Gaulle's approval. At that time Weston said de Gaulle had given him a "go ahead" to break up cartels and price rings that make most a luxury item in most French homes.
