Red Cross First Aid Classes At Summerside

The first of six monthly refresher classes for Red Cross first aid instructors was held in the Summerside High School last evening; with 11 instructors present. Mrs. Harry Cudmore, director of first aid for P.E.I., introduced the speakers of the evening, Mr. Earle Cannon and Dr. Austin Delaney. Mr. Cannon described the needs of civil defence and in particular, spoke of the important role first aid would play after enemy bombing.

He told of the need for personnel trained in fire fighting and for engineers to restore public utilities as rapidly as possible. Other people would be needed to maintain sanitation and to police bombed areas and to rescue work. Almost all these people, he said, would need to be trained in first aid. This created a need for a large number of trained people in first aid and organization is ten percent of the goal set by the civil defence population throughout Canada.

Mrs. Cudmore explained that a request had been received by the Red Cross from the Department of Health and Welfare which is in charge of civil defence to organize first aid training in the province. The objective would be a total of 9,600 first aiders whereas only 1,500 are trained at present. Mrs. Cudmore said this could be achieved over a three year period and the first objective would be to increase the number of first aid instructors and keep existing instructors in good standing. She felt that the Red Cross could provide the instructors but wondered if the public would respond in sufficient numbers.

Dr. Austin Delaney gave an informative talk on the effects and treatment of burns and frostbite.—S.

Canada's Exports Outpace Imports During September

OTTAWA, Oct. 25 —(CP)—Canada's exports during September outpaced imports to give her the second monthly surplus this year.

In a preliminary statement, the Bureau of Statistics today estimated September shipments at \$123,500,000, a \$40,000,000-jump from \$83,500,000 last year.

Imports, at \$111,800,000, climbed only \$12,000,000 from last year's \$99,800,000, leaving a surplus of \$11,700,000.

In July, domestic exports of \$378,600,000 topped imports of \$370,600,000, resulting in a favorable balance of \$8,000,000.

September's surplus reduced the over-all deficit for nine months of trade to \$324,100,000—still one of the highest in history.

Another major development in September's trade was a sharp reversal in Anglo-Canadian-American trading trends.

Canada's exports to the United States dropped about \$6,000,000 from a year ago, but shipments to Britain climbed more than \$20,000,000, helping Canada jump the balance hurdle to the surplus side.

Shipments to the U.S. were estimated at \$189,500,000, compared with last year's \$195,500,000, while imports increased to \$212,800,000 from \$177,400,000.

The deficit of \$23,300,000 in the monthly trade with the U.S. brought the total U.S. deficit for nine months to \$431,000,000.

In trade with Britain, Canada exported \$32,800,000 worth of goods, a sharp jump from \$30,600,000 last year. But her purchases from that country fell sharply to \$28,600,000 from \$36,200,000, giving Canada a surplus of \$4,200,000.

Let's Talk It Over A Prince County Viewpoint

The melancholy days are here! The trees are losing their brightly colored leaves, and are taking on the gloomy spectral appearance of winter. The greeting of the sun is becoming increasingly cold and aloof. "All the days look backward at the days that went before." But we Islanders are looking forward; first to the visit of our future queen and her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh; then, to the joyous Yuletide season which provides such a thrilling climax and happy ending to the year's story.

We as individuals can do our little bit to make the forces of good more powerful, and thus weaken a little the forces of evil. Our contribution, seen in the light of the finished products of good and evil, seems infinitesimal, it is true, but multiplied by the number of people willing to array themselves on our side, can be a compelling force. The Institute for the Blind, and the I.O.D.E. are now both appealing for help to carry on their splendid work. Let us give to them generously.

Canadian Army Casualty List

OTTAWA, Oct. 25 —(CP)—The army today issued its 67th casualty list of the Korean war, reporting one officer and three men killed in action and seven men wounded.

This brought to 380 the number of casualties so far suffered by Canadian troops in Korean action, including 84 dead, 262 wounded, 32 injured and two missing. The list:
