ing, wireless operation, trade dress-making and art applied to industry.

In The Maritimes

Most serious overcrowding is expected in Newfoundland. Schools in St. John's, officials say, will be overcrowded but adequate, but in the rural areas, 70 schools which operated last year will not open to return to the tiny settlements.

In the Maritimes, facilities were termed adequate to handle an expected record enrolment. Increased salaries and improved pension schemes have eased a teacher shortage which caused many permissive licences to be granted last year to teachers in backwoods schools.

In the Province of Quebec—where some schools will not open until Wednesday—extensions are being built to some city schools to handle this season's expected 71,500 pupils—an increase of 1,500 over last year. A streamlined English course, "North American literature," will be introduced into Quebec's Protestant schools.

Biggest problem in the Prairie provinces is a teacher shortage centering in Manitoba. Teachers are being lacking in many rural schools of that province and several hundred persons will be issued permissive licences to teach in rural schools. In the cities of the three provinces, facilities are said to be "adequate."

Two touchy situations mar an otherwise happy picture in the British Columbia educational system. In the Salmon Arm District,

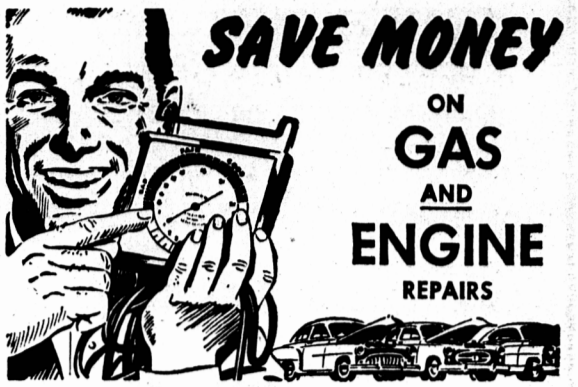
