NON-RESIDENT GUNNERS

land, and the declination of game
birds in the Pownal and Water-
side area in the early days of the
season were deplored by a mem-
ber resident in that district.
It was stated that the farmer,
who often feeds and protects the
game birds through the winter
season, and who is usually busy
harvesting during the early part
of the season, was thus deprived
of his fair share of game.
It was suggested that one rem-
edy would be to delay the opening
of the season for two weeks and
possibly bar the admittance of
non-resident gunners for two fur-
ther weeks. It was also suggested
that the season should open for
all game and migratory birds at
the same time.
Another point raised in order to
combat hunting over land without
obtaining permission, was that
there be a clause in the Game
Act providing for a penalty of \$25
for trespassing when hunting and
fishing. It was felt that no defini-
tive decision should be taken on
these matters until they had been
further discussed at a proposed
meeting to be held in Pownal
sometime in March, and a complete
cross-section of opinion of the
full Island membership had been
obtained.

Free Spending Visitors

The free spending of the Amer-
ican hunter, with benefits to the
Province as a whole was cited by
a member, who stated that from
his own personal records, the cost
to the non-resident hunter was in
the vicinity of \$50 per bird. He
said it was a rare occurrence for
a non-resident hunter to bag his
limit in any one day. He knew of
only two hunters who had done
that in the past season. It was
also stated that the money accrued
from non-resident licenses to a
great extent paid for the erection
of dams, which too, were of much
benefit to the whole Province.

A motion, to the effect that at-
tention would be brought to the
Government to obtain an increase
in the fox bounty from the pres-
ent two dollars to four dollars was
passed. In conclusion, Mr. Mac-
Nutt urged anyone who knew of
game birds in distress due to the
recent inclement weather to get
in touch with the Association or
with the Game Supervisor in order
that feed and grit could be dis-
tributed. The cost of such feed will
be borne by the Association.

Seek To Re-float Grounded Freighter

CASABLANCA, Jan. 23 - (Reu-
ters) - The tug Hercules arrived
today from Gibraltar to help in ef-
forts to re-float the American cargo
ship Newberry Victory, aground in
the outer harbor of Casablanca with
50 crew members and 2,500 tons of
material for American bases in Mor-
occo on board. The 11,000-ton New-
berry Victory drifted ashore early
yesterday when her anchor dragged
while she was waiting to berth.
In earlier years more than 200
different offences were punishable
by death under English law.

Improvement of the church pro-
gram, at a cost exceeding \$8,400.
Contributions to the Missionary
and Maintenance Fund, which is
administered by the Head Office
of the Church at large in Toron-
to, were sent forward from Trin-
ity to the amount of \$13,022.11.
In addition, the Women's Mission-
ary Society and associated organi-
zations had remitted nearly \$2-
000 for the service of the mis-
sions of the church.

Adding together the amounts
for local expenditure and those
contributed for the use of the
United Church at large, a total
of upwards of \$50,300 was raised
last year by Trinity United
Church.

But the raising of money was
not the chief activity of this
congregation. A large number of
organizations reported a wide
range of activity. Religious wor-
ship and instruction, study, youth
training supervised recreation,
charities and other work, en-
gaged the devoted labors of a
very large number of men and
women, young people and boys
and girls.

Reports were presented on be-
half of the Board of Trustees, the
Music Committee, the Benevolent
Fund, the Willing Circle of the
King's Daughters, the Woman's
Association, the Junior Woman's
Association, the Women's Mission-
