THE SECOND FAILURE.

That General Buller's second attempt to relieve Ladysmith has resulted in failure, is admitted. The relative positions of the opposing armies are as they were before the second attempt was begun—except that both are minus a number of good men. What's to be done about it will be for Lords Roberts and Kitchener to decide. We anticipate a movement from the points at which General Buller ought to have begun operations, viz. De Aar and Colesburg. In any case, the staying qualities of the British soldiers will now be tested,—perhaps to the utmost. They have shown splendid courage. The mistakes that have been made on their parts have all been in the direction of recklessness. As for the General, history must decide, in the light of all the facts and conditions. In the meantime, General Buller will probably go to the rear. He hasn't succeeded, and whatever his abilities and virtues may be, he must take the consequences of his failure.

LIBRARIES FOR FARMERS.

We direct attention to Mr. Cyrus Crosby's paper on "The Value of Literature," published in this day's issue of THE EXAMINER. Addressing his fellow farmers, Mr. Crosby says that "our highest aim should be that we as farmers should live under the best conditions possible." The "home" of the farmer should be bright and happy; and there should be in it ample scope for intellectual development. No one will deny that something more than the ordinary party newspaper is needed to this end—though the well-conducted newspaper is not to be despised. The newspaper is indeed essential in the home. But it ought to be supplemented by good books. Mr. Crosby thinks that the works of the best authors should be within the reach of all; and that for this purpose the establishment of libraries in the various settlements of the Province is advisable. The suggestion is one to be considered by the leading men of the various localities. It can be acted upon in any settlement; and the cost at the beginning need not be great. Among the many benefits to be derived, Mr. Crosby includes a higher standard of political morality.

The defence of the Greenway ministers for leaving the Manitoba treasury empty is that they did not receive from the Dominion that \$300,000 of the school trust funds they counted on. It is remarked by the Montreal Gazette "that the blocking of the scheme to get Parliament to authorize the \$300,000 gift is thus justified. The school trust fund was created for the province's schools, not for the aiding of a needy political party."

Mr. George Laor, writing in the South African Review, says of the Boers that they are the craftiest, cruellest, most hypocritical, most dishonest, most untruthful, most overbearing, most immoral, and most ignorant race of white people in the world. This is not a complimentary certificate of character. But there is no doubt about the untruthfulness. They will bury hundreds of their killed, and then report that the result of the battle was three dead and four wounded.

Col. Sterle's appointment to the command of the Strathcona Horse is a rebuff to Mr. Sifton, who has been pulling the wires to secure the honor for his friend Major Walsh. The commander is a good military man, although he is not in the ring.

THEY WANT A HEARING.

Aginaldo's Counsellor Writes a Letter Explaining Filipino Situation.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—A letter received here from Senor Mabini, who is believed to be the strongest counsellor of Aginaldo and his congress says:

"The Philippine people do not sustain any systematic hatred against foreigners. On the contrary, they receive with pleasure and gratitude those who really wish to co-operate for their liberties and prosperity. Filipinos continue to fight against Americans not because of hatred, but to demonstrate that far from looking with indifference on the political situation, they know how to sacrifice themselves for a Government which assures individual liberties and is administered in conformity with the necessities and desires of its people.

"The present state of war does not permit the people to give frank expression to a manifestation of their aspirations. For this reason Filipinos wish ardently that the Congress of the United States shall hear them before deciding on their future. To this end the Filipinos ask Congress to nominate a civil commission, which may put itself in contact with Filipinos, who have influence in pacific villages as well as among the people under arms, or permit a commission of such Filipinos to go to America in order to express the desires of the people.

"I hope confidently that when the Americans and Filipinos know each other better, not only will the present conflict cease, but other future ones will be forestalled."

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Paris Exposition is to be opened on the 15th April.

—There is one comfort about the war. Goldwin Smith is in favor of the Boers.

—Some of the Liberals expected "a thousand majority" in Sherbrooke, and lost a lot of money bet upon the result.

—According to a special despatch from Pretoria, it is reported there that fourteen British officers will be exchanged for fourteen Boer officers.

—Mr. Greenway has left the finances of Manitoba in such a mixed up condition that Hugh John has found it necessary to appoint a commission to get order out of chaos.

—After the Premier and Messrs Fisher and Paterson had been out in Sherbrooke, the Minister of Finance and Mr. Tarte paid the constituency a special visit. Still Sherbrooke returned an Opposition candidate.

—All the accounts of the zeal and devotion of the colonial contingents on service in South Africa are exceedingly satisfactory, but sometimes their soldierly spirit carries with it a spice of humor. Col. Young, the Red Cross commissioner, relates the following incident, which happened to him at De Aar Junction:

"I soon found I had no chance of getting on to Modder River till some time next day, and, being fortunate enough to get up by Lieutenant Mance, R. E., in a railway carriage he had as an office. I went back to the train to get the very slight personal kit I had brought with me. While I was getting this a sentry had been placed at the end of the train behind me, and just as darkness fell in I was, of course, challenged, and not being able to give the countersign I was made a prisoner, the sentry—one of the Australian contingent, Victoria Rifles. I think—interpreting his orders so strictly that, though I was in uniform, he would not let me pass, "or," as he said "for the matter of that, the General either, if he could not give the countersign." Of course I had to be content to wait till an officer came for release." The colonial volunteer was right, and it is to be hoped the colonel appreciated the humor of the situation.
