

Repair Tenders Called For Tignish Breakwater

OTTAWA, (Special)—Tenders for essential repairs to the breakwater at Tignish, Prince County, were called here Wednesday by the Public Works Department. The project is estimated to cost in the vicinity of \$40,000 and a contract is expected to be awarded by the first week of April. The Tignish breakwater is one of the jobs in the riding for which J. Watson MacNaught, M.P. for Prince has asked for priority.

Sheet steel piling will be driven into the sea bottom immediately outside the existing breakwater walls and the interior is to be filled with rock and sand. The whole surface is to be covered with a reinforced concrete slab deck. Overall length of the new work

will be 147 feet along the channel face and 143 along the back face. Labor is to be engaged by the contractor either from the National Employment Service or from trade unions with which the contractor has collective agreements. Preference also must be given to competent and available ex-employees.

Plows Make Progress In Road Clearing Work From S'side

Six snow plows were working on the main highway west of Summerside with the road open to the Elmsdale vicinity about 9:30 p.m. last evening and hoping to reach Alberton Thursday by noon. The Trans Canada Highway through Bedouque, Searletown, and Seven Mile Bay to Borden, and the highway from Summerside to Kensington was reopened for traffic Wednesday morning, and work will begin this morning (Thursday) to open the highway from Kensington towards Charlottetown.

A private service was held from the Compton Funeral Home on Tuesday, March 5th. The service was conducted by the Rev. C.R. Webber of Trinity United Church. Hymns sung were What a Friend We Have in Jesus, a favourite of the deceased, and the Lord Is My Shepherd.

S'side Board Wants Gov't To Enforce Daylight Saving Time

A resolution favoring government legislation in enforcing daylight saving time on Prince Edward Island during the summer months, and authorizing the president to contact the other Island Boards of Trade regarding this matter, was passed at a meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade held last evening in the Civic Building.

President C.R. MacLagan presided. The resolution was proposed by Mr. Frank Arnett, who stressed the dissatisfaction that has so often been expressed in the past by both urban and rural residents in regard to the non-uniform times that have prevailed throughout the Province.

Correspondence included three letters from J. Watson MacNaught M.P., one of which was in reply to a letter regarding the sorting of mail at the Summerside Post Office which, because of the late arrival of the evening train from the mainland, together with the mail night staff, means this mail hasn't get sorted until the next morning.

Mr. MacNaught replied that he had asked the Post Master General to look into the matter. Mr. MacNaught's correspondence to the board included a reply to a letter requesting action on the extension of shed facilities at Marine Wharf. The member said he had written the Department but not determined the dimensions of the extension but stated the last shed will be extended as far as possible.

In a further letter replying to a request for planking of the rail bed of the car ferry Prince Edward Island, Mr. MacNaught stated that the Department of Trade had finally concluded that the planking can be done, but no provisions were made in the estimate for this year. However Mr. MacNaught said he is endeavouring to have this work included in the supplementary estimates.

A resolution was approved recommending July 1st be observed as Dominion Day rather than the first Monday of the month. This resulted from a letter from the Canadian Chamber of Commerce which day the board favored for observance.

Leaves Ottawa For Visit To S'side

OTTAWA (Special)—J. Watson MacNaught, M.P. for Prince and parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister Sinclair, left Ottawa late Wednesday for a brief visit to Summerside. In response to many letters seeking appointments with him, Mr. MacNaught will be in his offices at Summerside on Friday and Saturday.

Rotarians Hear Appeal For Red Cross Campaign

Mr. K.T. Lapp local chairman of the forthcoming Canadian Red Cross Society campaign for funds was speaker at the regular luncheon meeting of the Summerside Rotary Club at noon on Tuesday.

In his address Mr. Lapp traced the history of the Red Cross and outlined many of the vital services it has rendered since its origin in Switzerland in 1864.

In addition to the free blood transfusion service the speaker discussed many other important undertakings which are perhaps not so familiarly known to most people. In Prince Edward Island last year treatment was provided for 153 children. 36 of this number were hospitalized, many being sent away for special operations and treatment. A very important program, so vitally important to Prince Edward Island is carried on by Red Cross and during the year just ended there were 5,157 enrollments. Locally this project is sponsored jointly by the Red Cross Society and the Y's Men's Club and in this area 112 awards were distributed among 800 enrollments.

20 Dressed Chicken Stolen

Twenty dressed chicken, each weighing from 6 to 8 pounds were stolen sometime Tuesday night in a break at the Maple Leaf Dairy, located beside the main highway just west of the Summerside town boundary.

Footprints in the snow indicated that two men were involved in the break. They first broke into a parked car nearby, and stole the tools with which to force their way through a locked rear door which had also been barred from the inside.

The chickens which were stolen had been contained in two bags, in each bag, within the dairy. In another part of the building the presence of a watch dog may have prevented the theft of live chickens which were separated from the dressed chickens by a partition.

The break is under investigation by members of the Summerside detachment of the R.C.M.P.

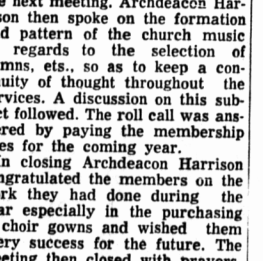

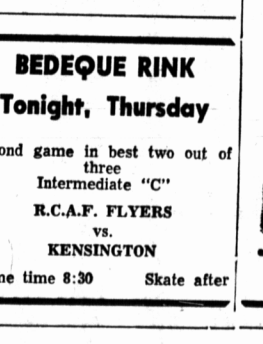
