WAR NEWS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 23.—The Turkish Government yesterday evening issued the following statement: "A reconnaissance with a force of infantry, six batteries of artillery and a cavalry division enabled Naim Pasha to occupy a position with eight battalions and some field batteries opposite the Greek forces centred south of the Miloua and Siulva passes. Haaki Pasha with twelve battalions advanced towards Neraly on the plain in order to threaten the retreat of the Greeks at Koskrena.

Naim Pasha defeated the Greeks and occupied the important heights of Karauja and Viran.

Hamid Pasha captured the fortified summits of Corloran and Garbika commanding the passes.

LONDON, April 24.—The Athens correspondent of the Times says: Those in authority here regard the situation as highly critical despite the favorite news from Epirus.

The fighting continues at Mati. The Crown Prince Constantine has ordered the troops to maintain a strictly defensive attitude.

A portion of the western squadron has been detached to bombard the fortress of Pargo, opposite Pax Island.

LONDON, April 24.—The Daily Chronicle's correspondent says "the Turks are greatly dismayed by the destruction of their stores at Katerina and at Litochorion."

Commodore Sachtouris destroyed the stores from the coast to the foot of Mount Olympus. Nothing remains therefore for Edhem Pasha to carry away but hunger.

The coast road being barred the only remaining road from Salonica is the Verria road eight days from Ellassona.

The reports of the injury to the railway line by the blowing up of bridges and tunnels are confirmed.

Financially everything is going well, and the value of paper money has risen.

It is reported here (Athens) that the Turkish troops will be withdrawn from Crete.

Private advices from Volo say that all the villages between Katerina and Verria have risen."

NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL

Mr. Foster's Answer to the Budget.

A MODERATE AND REASONABLE CRITICISM.

OTTAWA, April 24.—The Fielding Tariff did not receive indiscriminate condemnation at the hands of Hon. Mr. Foster yesterday. On the contrary, the ex-Finance Minister indirectly expressed approval of the general principle, and accepted it by observing that it was the same as the principle of his own tariff of 1894.

He denounced the double-dealing and dishonesty of the authors of the tariff, and condemned some of the details of the measure, which he proposed to criticize further at a later day.

Mr. Foster's speech was spirited and vigorous, and led up to many interruptions, which gave him opportunities to show his rare gift in repartee.

A spicy review of Mr. Fielding's introductory attack on the tariff followed, though Mr. Foster pointed out that the Finance Minister's course in leaving the tariff nine-tenths unchanged and the whole system practically as it was in 1894 was the best answer to his denunciation of the national policy.

The Finance Minister had started out to curse the tariff and behold he had blessed it altogether.

As to the proposed favored nation clauses Mr. Foster expressed the opinion that the British Treaties would include Germany, France and Belgium in any preferential scheme adopted in favor of England.

Mr. Laurier has invited Colonel Domville to accompany him to England on the Jubilee expedition as a member of the Premier's staff.

TELEGRAPHIC NOTES.

LARISSA, April 23.—The Greek Evezones and mountain battery have descended the mountains east of St. George monastery, and attacked the Turks on the flank. After a severe fight the Turks who on Monday had driven the Greeks from Mati and Liguri brought two hundred eighty Circassian cavalry from Ellassona. This was on Tuesday. The Circassians began to extend into the plain, and being raked by the Greek Mastropas battery and by the Evezones, they were compelled to fall back on Ligarsta, with great loss.

LONDON, April 22.—A despatch from Athens says: The national league of Greece (Ethniké Hetairia) has advanced the passage money for a thousand Garibaldians, who are expected at the Piræus immediately.

ATHENS, April 22, 5 30 p. m.—Prince Constantine, the Greek commander-in-chief, in a despatch from Larissa announces that he has been present at the scene of military operations against the Turks since early this morning. Prayers were offered up in the churches of every town in Greece today for the success of the Greek arms.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The first reference in congress to the Turko-Grecian war came up soon after the senate opened today, when Mr. Allan, of Nebraska, introduced the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the established policy of avoiding entangling alliances with European powers is in no respect violated by our sympathizing with the Christian people of Greece in their present heroic struggle against the advancement of the Ottoman empire; and that in the judgment of the senate it would be a recognition of the wishes of all for the executive to express to the government of Greece the sympathy of the American people."

"This present contest," proceeded Mr. Allan, "is the old question whether Christianity or paganism shall survive. In such a contest a great and powerful nation like the United States should not hesitate in voicing its sentiments promptly and loudly, that it may be heard throughout the world."

OTTAWA, April 22.—There is a big kick about jubilee arrangements. The regiment left out are protesting violently. Two Montreal crops have had delegations here. The crack corps, Ottawa 43rd, as well as 66th Halifax, is excluded. Many changes are understood to have been made in the lists and Sir Richard Cartwright's life has been made a burden to him.
