# Halifax 'Cradle' Claims Meet Scorn, Laughter

Mayor Vaughan of Halifax stirred up a bees' nest Wednesday when he claimed honor for his own city as the "real" cradle of Confederation.

Scorn, scholarly rebuttal and plain laughter have resulted all over the Island from statements made by the mayor to the effect that Charlottetown not only provided a cool reception for the visiting Fathers, but didn't provide an atmosphere conducive to serious consideration of federation.

Such blasphemies against the Island character and position were not to be tolerated. As one general feeling went, "We sure must be pulling a lot of wool over someone's eyes this summer if Mayor Vaughan's claims are right," and another, "where did our Fathers of Confederation Memorial Centre come from, anyway, if not from general acceptance of the fact that Charlottetown IS the cradle?"

Reactions from various prominent Islanders were more clearly spelled out in a number of interviews yesterday.

Premier Walter R. Shaw "fah!" a heavy guffaw. "I think the old Confederation cradle was a fairly large one and if others insist on lumping into it with Charlottetown there will be room for Mayor Vaughan's — possibly under the bed."

Dr. Frank Mackinnon, Island educator and intimately involved in the summer's centennial activities: "My good friend Mayor Vaughan joins a Gaspé politician who said Gaspe was the cradle because the Fathers talked about union when their ship sailed Gaspe. # Free Discussion Urged On Medical Questions

Dr. Frank Turnbull, president of the Canadian Medical Association, yesterday urged free discussion of medical questions by doctors, in an address to the annual meeting of the Medical Society of P.E.I.

One such topic the Vancouver physician said members of the profession should discuss was that of medical payment plans. A panel on the recommendations of the Royal Commission on Health Services and a talk by CMA secretary Dr. A.F.W. Peart tomorrow will bring that subject to the forefront.

Dr. Turnbull said the CMA has "noted, with increasing concern, the problem of over-utilization by patients and over-servicing by doctors' under all-inclusive medical plans.

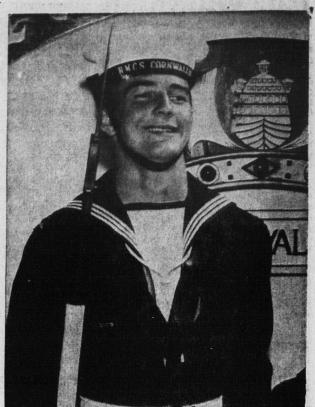
Speaking on the modern system of collaboration in medicine, he said it has increased the cost of medicine, and reduced the prestige of the doctor.

Dr. Turnbull advised that "the public and the politicians" be impressed with the continuing needs of hospitals, as well as with their initial costs.

He urged doctors' associations to keep lines of communications with nurses' organizations open.

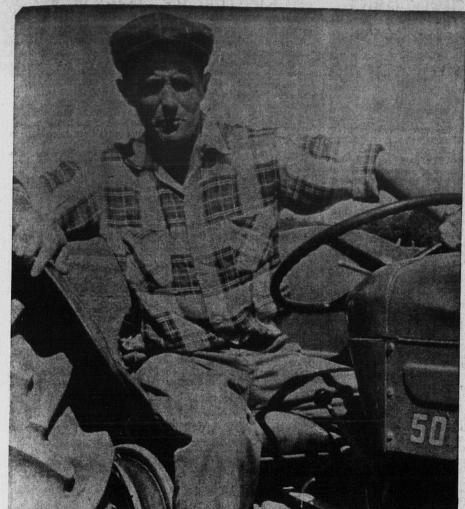
The association head also touched on the subject of preventive medicine, in which he said the family doctor should assume more responsibility.

He advocated a "tripartite" view of hospital direction and control, with doctors, trustees and administrator sharing control.

# 4th Prince Co. Plowing Victory Taken By Cascumper Farmer

Arthur Hudson of Cascumper proved unbeatable yesterday at the Prince County Plowing match in O'Leary as he chalked up his third consecutive victory for a grand total of four wins since the match was instituted.

Lawrence Harris of Knutsford was a close second, with only one half point less than the winner, and Eric Phillips, O'Leary, was third two points down.

Mr. Harris had the best straw, Eric Phillips the straightest furrow and Art Hudson the best finish. There were 19 entries in the championship class, the largest to date.

Held in sunny weather the seventh annual match was officially opened by Hon. Andrew MacRae, minister of agriculture, who congratulated the officials and contestants on the large attendance this year. Mr. MacRae also complimented Broad Acres and Maple Leaf 4-H club for their fine, well-cared-for and trained calves.

S.C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture; Robert Campbell, M.L.A., and Allison Proffitt, who judged the 4-H calves, all spoke briefly.

Four teams entered the team pulling contest which attracted the close attention of the audience. The team owned by St. Ives Sweet, on whose farm the matches were held, placed first by pulling 4,100 pounds of lime on a drag sled. Eric Phillips, O'Leary, was second, Edmund DeRoche of Howland, third and Milford Ellis, West Cape, was fourth.

At the end of the afternoon events the largely-attended annual banquet was held in the United Church training center catered to by the ladies aid of the O'Leary Community Hospital.

Following the banquet the O'Leary Regional High School auditorium was filled to capacity for a band concert by the Royal Canadian Dragoon Band.
