Korean Christians Flee Communists

SOMEWHERE IN KOREA, Sept. 8.—(AP) — Among the thousands of white-clad refugees the path of the Korean war is one of the largest religious migrations of our time. It is made up of Korean Christians fleeing from Communism. They come from tiny hamlets among the saw-toothed ridges. They come from Korea's overcrowded cities. But the religious migrants all have the same purpose—to escape Communist restrictions. Headquarters of this massive pilgrimage is a Korean city which cannot be identified. More than 200 Christian ministers have taken sanctuary here. Many brought their congregations. Army officials estimate that more than 20,000 refugees here are religious migrants who fled before the Red invasion. Leader of the Moses-like mass of homeless persons is an American-educated Baptist minister. He is a native Korean who graduated from Princeton University. Because many of his family and associates are in Communist held territory, he must use an American name Dr. Henry N. Park. When the Communist invasion began Dr. Park immediately piled up stakes. Korean Reds offered him the choice of staying in his home and embracing Communism or leaving. He and many of his flock made their way south, always just a step ahead of the onrushing Reds until the United Nations line of defence was established. The little band ultimately was joined by some 200 other ministers and their congregations.

OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—(CP) — A bill giving the Government power to regulate and control consumer buying by stiffening the terms of instalment buying was introduced today in the Commons. The measure places permissive powers in the hands of the Federal Cabinet. It does not mention any goods that will be affected by the controls and it does not indicate what form the controls will take. The Cabinet would be given power to make regulations covering certain goods and to set out the terms of instalment buying for consumer products. Government sources said the controls will be put into effect on a piece-meal basis. They would also cover the repayment of loans obtained to pay for consumer goods. The controls probably would be applied against such items as clothing, footwear, radios, refrigerators, washing machines and passenger cars. They would not include real estate, trucks, farm machinery or any other kind of capital or producer commodity. The bill would remain in effect until July 31, 1953, but could be replaced by the Cabinet at any time. It could be extended beyond the expiry date through action of Parliament.

At the request of counsel of both parties this case was further adjourned to a date to be fixed by the parties. The final case on the docket was that of a Montague resident and two residents of Georgetown and the action was for damages for wrongful taking and conversion. This case was also adjourned to a date to be fixed upon by the parties concerned and their counsel. The Court adjourned to a date to be set later.

Several Cases In Magistrate's Court At Georgetown

Several cases were heard by Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald, at the court house in Georgetown yesterday afternoon.

In the first, a resident of Caladonia, charged with failing to report an accident under the Highway Traffic Act, pleaded guilty and was fined \$5 and costs of \$4.00, or in default of payment, 30 days in jail.

In the next case a man appeared on behalf of his father, who was unable to appear, and entered a plea of guilty to a charge of having in his possession liquor not purchased at a vendors, contrary to the P. E. I. Temperance Act. A fine of \$20, costs of \$5.50, or 30 days in jail was imposed.

A Cardigan man, charged with unlawfully having in his possession liquor not purchased at a vendors, pleaded guilty and was fined \$35 and costs of \$2.50, or 30 days in jail.

A Cardigan man, charged with unlawfully having in his possession liquor not purchased at a vendors, pleaded guilty and was fined \$25 and costs of \$2.50, or 30 days in jail.

A resident of Greek River, charged with unlawfully causing a disturbance in a public place, under sec. 222b of the Criminal Code of Canada, entered a plea of guilty. He was fined \$20, costs of \$5.00, or 30 days in jail.

A Georgetown resident, charged with being intoxicated in a public place, contrary to the Temperance Act, pleaded guilty and was fined \$20 and costs of \$2, or two months in jail.

In the last case, a Georgetown resident pleaded guilty to being intoxicated in a public place and was fined \$20 and costs of \$5.00 or 30 days.

The court adjourned until Friday, Sept. 15.

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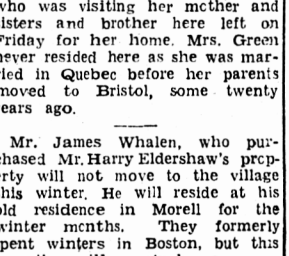
