The guest preacher for the occasion will be the Reverend Robert Lennox, M.A., Th.B., Ph.D., D.D., Principal of the Presbyterian College, Montreal.

He has been associated with the Presbyterian College, Montreal, since 1945 as Professor of Old Testament and since 1948 as Principal. In addition to his work in the college the Reverend Dr. Lennox has represented the Presbyterian Church in Canada at various conferences in the United States and Europe.
