

## 21 Constituencies Holding Federal Nominations Today

By FRASER MacDOUGALL, OTTAWA (CP) — Twenty-one electoral constituencies covering more than 80 per cent of Canada's land area but only six to seven per cent of her population and eligible voters hold official nominations Tuesday, May 22, for the June 18 federal election.

Nominations in the other 242 of the 363 constituencies, two of which return two members apiece, close Monday, June 4, two weeks before the election. The Canada Elections Act fixes close of nominations in the 21 large, scattered constituencies for four weeks in advance of the vote. However, it also provides for a shift to the following day in event the scheduled Monday is a holiday—thus it's Tuesday this time because of the Victoria Day holiday.

The extra two weeks is needed in the 21 constituencies, lying across the northern part of the country, to get ballots printed and then to deliver them and other election supplies in areas where there are virtually no land transportation facilities.

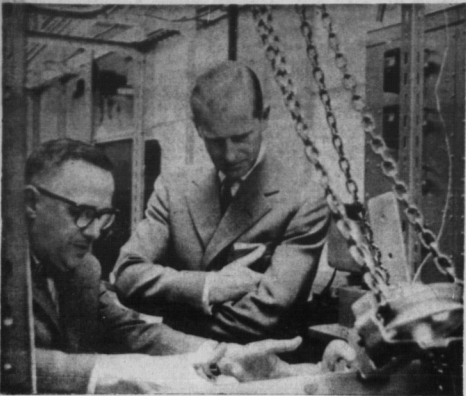
**COVER LARGE AREA**  
The 21 cover an area of 3,085,752 square miles, slightly more than four-fifths of Canada's total area of 3,851,800 square miles. However, their population at the 1961 census of 1,232,000 was slightly under seven per cent of the Canadian total of 18,238,247.

Number of eligible voters for June 18 is not yet known. In the last election, in 1958, voters lists for the 21 showed 549,681 eligible, slightly more than six per cent of the Canadian total of 8,131,200.

Biggest single constituency is the Northwest Territories, enlarged from the old Mackenzie River constituency first established for the 1953 election, to take in all three of the territories—Franklin and Keewatin as well as Mackenzie. Election officials say it covers 1,250,000 square miles, more than the combined total for the three largest provinces of Quebec, Ontario and British Columbia.

Saguenay in Quebec is second largest with 374,950 square miles and the Yukon Territory ranks third with 207,076. The smallest is Trinity-Conception in Newfoundland of whose 2,245 square miles exceeds Prince Edward Island's 2,184.

**COMPARE VOTERS**  
Port Arthur in Ontario, which stretches from Lake Superior to Hudson Bay, has the biggest population of the 21 with 67,377. Newfoundland's Grand Falls-White Bay-Labrador ranks next with 12,433, then B.C.'s Caribou with 12,173. The Yukon has the smallest
