ARBOR DAY.

What Was Done in the City Schools.

THIS was Arbor Day in the City Schools. The weather throughout was fine and clear and the sun shone brightly.

UPPER PRINCE STREET SCHOOL. The exercises at Upper Prince Street School began at 10 o'clock. The pupils of each department were formed into groups, and, under the direction of their teachers, planted trees on the school grounds.

At this institution the proceedings began shortly before 10 o'clock with tree-planting by the pupils. Fourteen trees in all were planted. The varieties included locust, linden, mountain ash, oak leaf mountain ash, sycamore and birch.

QUEEN SQUARE SCHOOL. The teachers and pupils of this school celebrated the day by preparing the flower-beds in front of the schoolhouse. Lessons on trees and tree planting were given in some of the schoolrooms.

The Trouble on the Claribel.

A tag with a medical man and the assistance asked for by Captain Welsh, as already related in THE EXAMINER, went out to the bark Claribel yesterday afternoon and brought ashore the man in irons, whose name was Jennings, the man McCourt, who jumped overboard and tried to make the shore, and a seaman belonging to Halifax, who was suffering with inflammation of the lungs.

Questioned as to the reason of his being put in irons he said it was for striking the Captain on the head with a mallet because he thought he and the crew were plotting to throw him and McCourt overboard. After he struck the Captain he says he was pounced upon by the officers and crew, roughly handled, and put in irons.

After the men were removed, and the anchor weighed, the Claribel proceeded to sea.

The New Senator.

SIR.—The appointment of the Hon. A. A. Macdonald to the Senate does not appear to meet the views of the editor of THE EXAMINER; and on behalf of the Liberal-Conservatives of King's County, who have time and again proved their loyalty to that party, I would respectfully enter a protest against the tenor of your editorial in the Daily of the 13th inst.

No one will deny the combative instincts of Mr. Ferguson, nor will anyone say that he has not done yeoman's service in behalf of the party with which he is allied. But in order to maintain the dignity in the Senate which your editorial claims for that body, something more than pugnacity is required.

It should not be forgotten that A. A. Macdonald is one of the men who fought the people's battles in the times of Coles and Whelan, and on account thereof, was particularly honored at the meeting of the Quebec Conference in 1864, when the initial steps were taken that resulted in the formation of the Dominion of Canada.

And apart from this, it has been long felt by the Catholics of this Province that their body should have fuller representation in the Dominion Parliament. With the new Senator, the Catholics have only four men out of ten, and that is no more than their share, taking the relative strength of the Catholic and Protestant population.

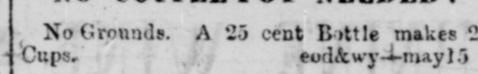
