Ted Williams Is Sidelined

BOSTON (AP)—Ted Williams, a strained expression on his face, entered hospital Monday for treatment of what he called "a tank in my neck."

The Boston slugger vowed, however, he'd open the season patrolling left field for the Red Sox. There was no encouragement from doctors. Neither did they say immediately that the 40-year-old batting artist wouldn't be on hand when the American League opens April 10.

A medical bulletin said Williams would begin traction treatments to relieve the pain and that orthopedic consultations would be held in a day or two.

Williams was a disappointed man when he arrived at the hospital. "I was just getting into shape," he lamented.

Williams, who can point to almost as many injuries as batting titles, said "I evidently twisted my neck in such a way I pinched a nerve."

Doctors would say only that it will take time to determine precisely the nature of Williams' trouble. A spokesman said an accurate diagnosis may be available. Williams was afflicted about two weeks ago at the Red Sox training camp in Scottsdale, Ariz. At first he thought he had a stiff shoulder.

He underwent treatment here. After x-ray examination results were turned over to the Red Sox management, the club front office ordered him to Boston.

ALL HOCKEY EYES will be focused on Chicago and Toronto tonight where two highly important Stanley Cup semi-final games are to be played. In Chicago, the Black Hawks, given new life by that 4-3 decision on Saturday night, will be attempting to square their series with Montreal Canadiens at two games apiece. Over at Maple Leaf Gardens, those brats of Punch Imlach's are all set to knot up their best of seven series with MIT Schmidt's Boston Bruins.

WE HAVE the notion, and it could be a very foolish one, that when the teams head back to Montreal and Boston for those fifth games on Thursday night, matters will be 2-2 everywhere you look. Canadiens' and Bruins' supporters undoubtedly will not go along with this trend of thought but we are calling that way just the same.

In regard to the Boston-Toronto series, we feel we are not sticking our neck out one little bit. The Leafs richly deserved that triumph on Saturday night and Bruins surely looked all in as the contest drew to a close. The Toronto club has youth on its side and that should stand them in good stead as this series progresses. The loss of Doug Mohns for Tuesday's game at least is a tough blow to the Beantowners and it's not unlikely that Doug will be out the rest of the series.

MOHNS IS A CAPABLE REARGUARD and Boston needs such gentlemen if they are to discourage the trips of the youthful Leafs over night and if that continues the veteran Harry Lumley is in for even more hardship than he has endured in those first three battles. Lumley has been terrific but one of these nights he could get a bit exhausted and disgusted. If that happens, then Leafs could have a field day.

THE SHOOTING of the Imlach crew has not been too good in these first three games. They had some great opportunities but failed to make them pay off. If the Toronto crew can get sharper in this shooting department, then they will give the former Leaf netminder the busiest of times.

And speaking of Lumley reminds us of something that really got under our skin as we watched the game last Saturday night. We realize fully how much Foster Hewitt has done for hockey over the years but we couldn't stomach his apparent unwillingness to give credit to Lumley for the great part he had played in all three games. He did admit that old Lum was great in the 8-1 opener but after that he failed to stress the importance of Harry in the Boston cage. Foster gave more credit to the Boston defence than he did to the veteran.

Anyone who watched Saturday's game couldn't help but be impressed by Lumley's gymnastics. In the first 15 minutes of that second period and all through the third, Harry rose to really great heights. Andy Bathgate, picking the three stars, thought so too and picked the goalie as his second star despite the fact that Ehlman had beaten him with the overtime tally. Hewitt asked Bathgate why he had arrived at his conclusion and Andy didn't take too long to state his reasons. In Bathgate's opinion, it was Lumley that kept Bruins in the hockey game and made the Leafs do overtime to achieve their first series victory.

THIS COLUMNIST is hollering for a Leaf victory but we like to see an old timer like Lumley get what's coming to him. He may falter as this series goes along but up to now he's been the biggest Bruin of them all. Perhaps, we were just in an ugly mood and misunderstood the great sportscaster. We hope that was the case. It surely must have been because it's hard to swallow that Lumley's greatness ended with that first game in Boston.

If the one-time Maple Leaf wasn't a hero again in the second game, then the reports of that game we have been reading are surely all wet. You saw the third game yourself, so we need not pass any comment on that.

We leave that to your own intelligence.

AND NOW what about those Canadiens tonight without the great Jean Beliveau? Sure they have an abundance of great players but even so you can't lose a superstar like Beliveau and not be hurt. The Hawks will do their utmost to tie things up tonight and the job should be much easier with Big John out of the way. It's wonderful what a team can do once they get fired with a little inspiration. Chicago players undoubtedly have their sights on those \$350 cheques. Those kind of papers can give real inspiration. With one win under their belts now, the Black Hawks may have gotten the idea that they have a chance to whip those Canadiens. That kind of an idea is most necessary for success and Hawks probably have it in abundance.

However, it's a long way home for the Windy City boys but, perhaps, if they blow hard enough they will topple the house of To Blake.

Master Brent Schurman presented bouquets of roses to Mrs. Clarence Steele and Mrs. John Steele, and Ben Harkness and Fenton McNeill made the presentations of gifts to the Steele children. CHICAGO (CP)—An old-timer and a youngster were on hand Monday when Montreal Canadiens and Chicago Black Hawks worked out in preparation for tonight's all-important fourth game of the best-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-final.

Ken Mosdell, 36-year-old veteran, was summoned from Montreal Royals of the Quebec Hockey League to fill in for Canadiens' ace scorer Jean Beliveau. Ron Ingram, 11-year-old Hawks' junior, came in from the Hawks' Buffalo farm team of the American Hockey League to take over for defenceman Elmer Vasko.

The Hawks staged an uprising Saturday to pull out a 4-2 win and now trail 2-1 in games. The fifth game will be played in Montreal Thursday.

Beliveau suffered a fracture of two vertebrae when checked into the boards by the Hawks' Glen Skov. Vasko threw out his trick shoulder when he barged into Montreal's Dickie Moore.

MOSDELL'S LINEMATES Mosdell worked out with Benafie Geoffrion and Ab McDonald as linemates. Henri Richard was with Dickie Moore and Marcel Bonin, the same pair with whom he worked Saturday in coach Toe Blake's surprise change of lines. Blake was still riled up about the work of referee Red Storey. "It was the worst I've ever seen in the NHL or in Stanley Cup play," he said. "Everything went. Beliveau didn't even have the puck when he was slammed into the boards by Skov. "Now we can be in for trouble."

Bruins' Injured Mohns Is Replaced By Morrison

TORONTO (CP)—He won't admit it but maybe Lynn Patrick, Bruins general manager, was being psychic last fall when he traded Allan Stanley to Toronto Maple Leafs for Jim Morrison.

Bruins were knee-deep in defencemen at the time but they had only one good rushing defenceman, Doug Mohns. If anything happened to "The Diesel," Bruins would be in trouble. That's where Morrison came in.

Something has happened to Mohns. He'll miss tonight's Stanley Cup playoff game here when Boston tangles with Toronto Maple Leafs. Bruins lead the best-of-seven semi-final 2-1.

Morrison is one of five current Bruins who once played for Leafs. Goaltender Harry Lumley, whose play has been sensational far in the series, MacNeil and defencemen Leo Bolvin and Flaman are the others.

BEST SEASON The 27-year-old Morrison enjoyed his best season in a scoring way during the regular National Hockey League schedule, scoring 25 points, including eight goals. Other than Mohns, Bruins expect to be at full strength tonight. Schmidt says he'll go along with Lumley, filling in for regular netminder Don Simmons who had his appendix removed near the end of the regular season.

"I'm still confident that we'll win this series," Schmidt said. "The boys might be down a little after losing Saturday's game but it's up to me to get them up again. I think I can."

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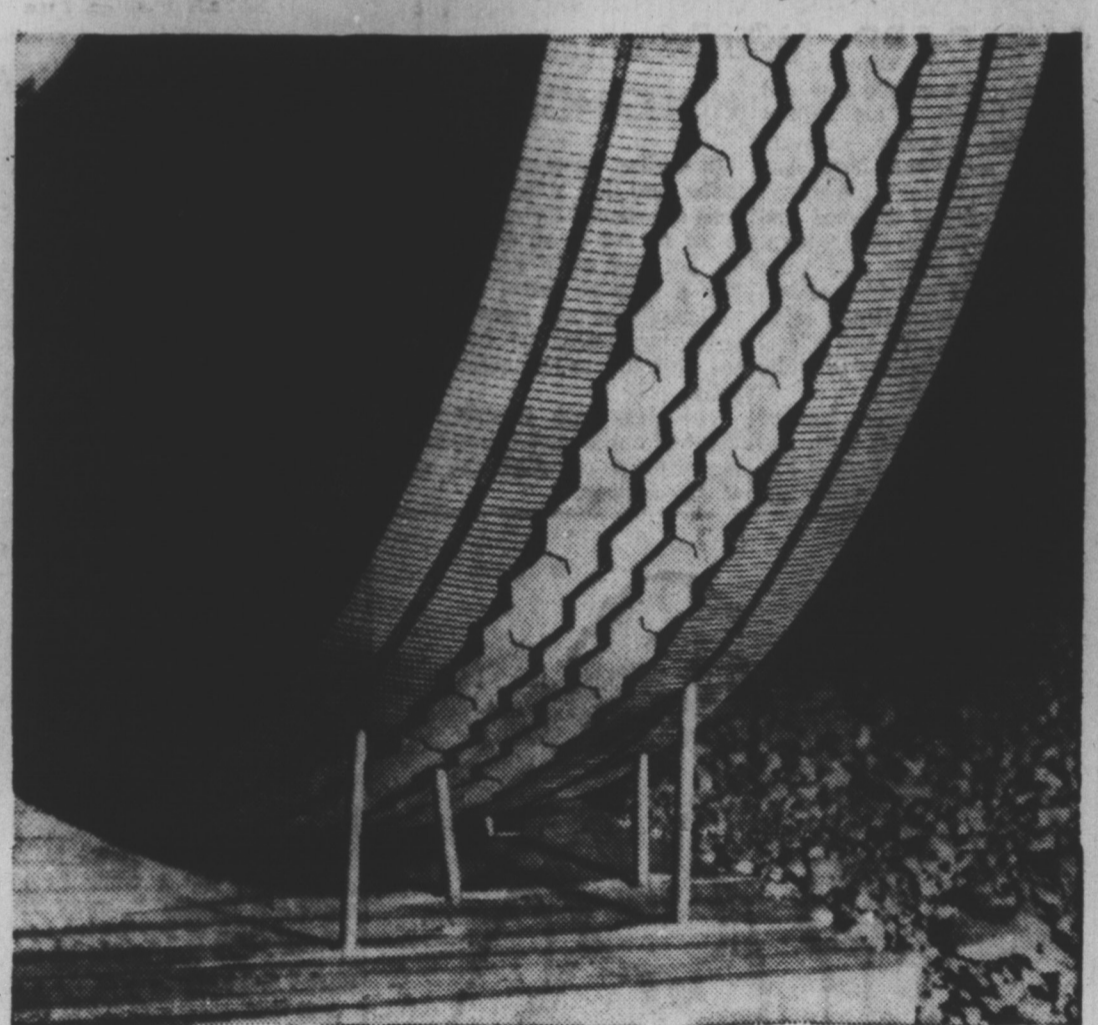
