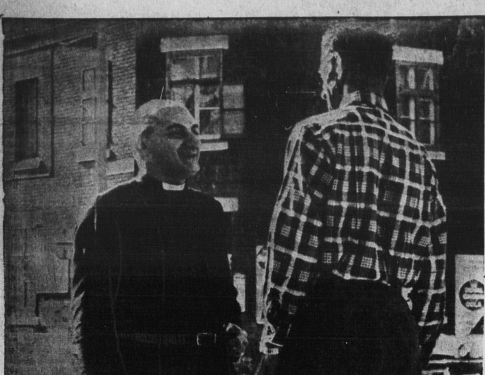


Negro Student is Cam After Second Day in Class

OXFORD, Miss. (AP) — James H. Meredith, sitting on an iron cot in a bare dormitory room, said Tuesday he considers his enrollment in the University of Mississippi to be "more for America than it is for me."
Meredith is the first Negro knowingly admitted as a student in the university's 114-year history.
In an interview, he showed no visible signs of nervousness or apprehension after the explosive riot last week after his arrival Sunday night.
Meredith said quietly: "I hope now the situation gets back to normal as soon as possible so that the students can continue their studies normally. That's what I want more than anything else now."
This was his second day to attend classes. He was escorted by Federal Marshal James McShane to the school at 8 a.m., where he attended an hour's class in American colonial history.
"His second class was in political science."
He took a seat toward the back of the room. Two other male students sat a little farther back.
UNOCCUPIED SEATS
None of the seats directly adjacent to Meredith were occupied.
A crowd, estimated by McShane at around 40 had gathered in front of the building when Meredith entered.
However, he said in the interview that he has greeted him saying "hello" or "good morning."
"I haven't seen any students in class who appeared to be friendly."
After his first day in class Monday, McShane said there had been no reaction from white classmates.
Meredith indicated emphatically today that he intends to remain in the university until he has his degree.
There have been rumors that, having been enrolled at Mississippi, he would attend institutions where he has been offered scholarships.
"Change is never pleasant," Meredith said. "If this situation stops me here, then it's no different from being stopped officially."
PAYS TRIBUTE
"It is a fact that Negroes are not looked up to and are treated as something other than first-class citizens in Mississippi. That's why every citizen has an opportunity to be a citizen."
Meredith paid high tribute to his professors at Mississippi. Pointing out that he has attended only a few classes, Meredith said of the faculty: "The instructors appear to be a much more professional group than any school I've ever been in before."

N.S. Scholarship Winner Revealed

HALIFAX (CP) — The 1962 Queen Elizabeth scholarship, given to the Nova Scotia student who makes the highest aggregate in grade 11 provincial examinations, has been awarded to William Douglas Lawrence of Kentville, N.S. It was announced Tuesday by Premier Stanfield.
The \$4,000 scholarship was first awarded in 1959 to commemorate the visit of Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh to the province.
Lawrence has enrolled at Acadia University in Wolfville, N.S., where he will study mathematics. The \$4,000 represents \$1,000 a year for a normal four-year course.

Thieves steal Knives In Souris Co-op Break

SOURIS — Thieves with an apparent liking for sharp pointed instruments, especially knives, made their way into the co-operative store here sometime Monday night or early Tuesday morning.
Taken in the break, believed to be the work of juveniles, was an assortment of hardware, including screwdrivers and knives. The intruders even went so far as to go into the meat cutting department and help themselves to the knives used for cutting the meat. Also taken was a quantity of shotgun shells.
Entry was gained by going through a cellar window and up the stairs. The store manager apparently the thieves tried to carry away their load in two of the store's shopping bags. These were found torn on the floor.
However, two 100lb bags were found to suit the purpose, but not before the contents of one, which was half filled with food, was dumped on the floor.
Before leaving, the "after-hour customers" shattered a number of eggs on the walls and on the front door. Exit was made by unbolting the back door, which was found to be wide open when the break was discovered.

SOURIS — A minor car accident occurred near Bristol yesterday when a vehicle driven by Lyman MacEwen, Bristol, was involved in a collision with another vehicle, driven by George Haselden, Souris.
Mr. Haselden was proceeding toward Souris and Mr. MacEwen was apparently coming out of a side lane. Both vehicles were slightly damaged.
The accident was investigated by the RCMP detachment of the RCMP.

New Fishing Regulations Are Lauded

Attorney-General Melvin McQuaid expressed pleasure yesterday over federal regulations, announced last week, which prohibit dragger operations in a section of coastal waters in the Souris area.
"We have been pressing for these regulations for some time," he said, "for the benefit of inshore fishermen in the area, who were losing gear because of dragger fishing."
"I think the new regulations will meet the requirements of the inshore fishermen. It seems the only way that they can be protected from gear loss."
Previously, evidence that draggers were in the area had to be gathered before action could be taken. Now, all a fisherman has to do is catch a dragger in the restricted area and legal action can be taken.

Expert's Traffic Report Received

The complete report on the Charlottetown traffic situation, prepared by Laurie Mannell, Oakville, Ontario, traffic expert, arrived on schedule Monday, city councillor William Mackinnon, chairman of the police committee, said yesterday. The police committee will meet this afternoon and consider the report, and the matter will most likely be on the agenda of the city council meeting on Tuesday of next week.
There is a lot of matter contained in the report, councillor Mackinnon said, and he was not certain that the complete contents could be dealt with by the committee for full presentation to the council Tuesday night.
According to earlier reports, this new complete report was to contain all required maps and pinpoint the location of new installations of separate timed parking meters and a properly arranged parking area.
When Mr. Mannell's earlier report was presented after his study of city traffic, council members argued that essential information was lacking, and a suggestion and recommendations until a complete report, covering the entire situation.

DENIES CHARGE
In a three-hour and 15-minute speech, he denied the Liberal chairman's charge that the government deceitfully concealed the origin exchange crisis from the Canadian public during the campaign leading to the election.
"It was an unprincipled suggestion" of Mr. Pearson that he had withheld facts regarding Canadian problems.
"I not only did not conceal facts from the Canadian people but I placed before them the facts as they were," Mr. Diefenbaker declared.
The Liberals would have Canadians believe the government was concealing the facts by saying the economy was on the upswing, he said.

Montague Man Is Studying At College For Deaf

MONTAGUE — A young Montague man, Irvin MacDonald, who is studying for his arts degree at Gallaudet College, Washington, D.C., has returned for his third year.

This answered those who maintain that Canada could have exchange difficulties only in times of economic stringency, Mr. Diefenbaker said.
