Rangers Tied With Habs For Third Spot In N. H. L.

NEW YORK, Feb. 26 (CP)—New York Rangers tonight scored three goals in a little more than three minutes in the second period to edge Boston Bruins 4-3 and move into a tie for third place with idle Montreal in the tightening National Hockey League race.

Minus three of their regulars, including star centre Edgar Laprade, the Rangers called up two players from the New York Rovers farm club. The move paid off handsomely.

Centre Odie Lowe and right winger Don Smith made their N. H. L. debuts successful ones, each scoring a goal.

Lowe, a 21-year-old 150-pounder, put the Rangers ahead 1-0 in the first minute of the opening period with an unassisted goal. The Bruins quickly knotted the count at 2:52 while defenceman Gus Kyle of the Rangers was in the penalty box. Bud Poile, the ex-Ranger, whipped in Captain Milt Schmidt's pass through goalie Chuck Rayner's legs.

Defenceman Bill Quackenbush put the Bruins ahead for the first and only time in the game when he dribbled in a screened shot in the first 58 seconds of the middle session.

MONTREAL 3, BOSTON 2

MONTREAL, Feb. 26 (CP)—Montreal Canadiens struck swiftly for two third-period goals Saturday night and withstood a blistering Boston Bruins' drive to win 3-2 before a crowd of 13,460 fans.

The winning goal went to Maurice Richard, his 32nd of the season, and the Bruins' loss was a severe setback to their bid for a National Hockey League playoff spot.

Canadiens vaulted into third place over New York Rangers and were idle tonight while the Rangers entertained the fifth-place Bruins.

Leo Gravelle and Norm Dussault gave the Canadiens their other goals and Bud Poile and Paul Rorty racked up Boston's pair in the second period.

Both teams, fighting desperately for the valuable points, put on a rugged, hard-driving game although the hockey was not particularly brilliant. Canadiens, with three losses and three ties to show for their previous six games, rained 34 shots on goalie Jack Gelineau who put on a sensational display.

At the same time, Canadiens gunned up several wide-open chances by their own ineptness. Canadian goalie Bill Durnan, whose leg was injured by Silvio Bettio's hard shot in the second period, handled 21 shots and was brilliant under Boston's third-period assault. At one time, the Bruins kept play inside the Montreal blue line for nearly the full two minutes of a penalty before the struggling Canadiens could ice the puck.

In the last 30 seconds, Gelineau was pulled from the Boston net but the Bruins couldn't capitalize on two faceoffs in the Montreal end nor could Canadiens get a shot at the empty goal.
