Domion Finances.

It seems more than probable that the small deficit of last year—caused by the Northwest rebellion—will be fully met by the surplus of this year. So far the official statements of revenue and expenditure show the following very gratifying results:

Table with 2 columns: Item, Amount. Revenue: \$11,469,084; Expenditure: 8,754,675; Surplus: \$2,705,409.

As compared with the same period of last year there is an increase in revenue amounting to \$1,404,631, and a decrease in expenditure of \$2,201,602! At this time last year a deficit was shown of \$900,824; now, as shown above, there is a surplus of \$2,705,409!

The increased revenue is undoubtedly the result of an improvement in trade. Last year trade was dull and we had the Northwest rebellion. This year trade is buoyant, and there is no present prospect that the Government will be met by any extraordinary demand for money.

Customers show an increase of \$945,569 in four months, excise an increase of \$235,888, and railways and other public works an increase of \$223,183.

Our readers will, we are sure, agree with the Montreal Gazette that "this healthful and hopeful condition of the finances cannot prove other than satisfactory to every lover of his country."

"We've Had Enough of Him."

MR. THOMAS WALKER DODD poses before the noble army of discontents as one of those who deeply regret that this Province ever entered the Confederation. But, in 1873, this same gentleman was most anxious to join the Union on terms \$28,000 a year less favorable than those which were afterwards obtained. Here is the resolution, referring to the Laird-Haythorne Terms, for which Mr. Dodd actually voted:

"And Whereas the Legislative Council, having taken the said Minute and Terms of Union therein contained (Haythorne-Laird Terms) into its mature consideration, are of opinion that in view of the financial and commercial prospects of this Colony, it is advisable and expedient to agree to a Union with Canada, on the said terms in the said Minute of Council set forth."

Canvassers for Mr. Dodd ask electors to vote for him because they say "he is safe to protect the rights and interests of property-holders." But the above resolution, for which he voted, does not prove the truth of this contention. It proves, indeed, that the contention is entirely false; for the property-holders must now have been taxed to the extent of at least \$28,000 a year, had the Province been united to Canada under the terms which Mr. Dodd deemed "advisable, and expedient to agree to."

Whether we regard Mr. Dodd's consistency or judgment in this matter, we must conclude that he ought not to be supported by the Legislative Council electors of Charlottetown. A man who makes a bad blunder regarding an important matter may be forgiven; but sensible, intelligent men do not usually trust him again.

True, Mr. Dodd was elected in 1878; but what good has he done since? On the whole, it is but reasonable that the Legislative Council electors should now conclude that they have had enough of Mr. Dodd, and that they will now elect Mr. Horne, to help on the work which they elected Hon. Mr. McLeod and Mr. Patrick Blake to do.

—John Bright has written to the papers a letter in which he says that he will never accept the principle of political clubs and associations, that wherever the leader of the party goes the whole party is bound to follow. "We, the Liberals," he says, "have not yet an infallible leader, and until he appears I must preserve my liberty of judgment. The Liberal party will not be destroyed. It will be instructed and become more competent for future work. The reunion of the party will not come until a change comes which I may hope for, but at present discover no signs of a smooth platform. Talk will not bridge the chasm in our ranks."

—In a speech at Youghal, Ireland, on the 6th inst., Rev. Father Hayes, of Iowa, said: "If the American landlords acted like the Irish landlords, the people would, if they could, pelt them not only with dynamite, but also with heaven's lightning and hell's fires, until every British bull dog, whelp and cur was pulverized and made into top-dressing for the soil."

—Perhaps we ought not to mention it, but it's a fact that business in Montreal is steadily growing. The latest figures published show an increase of 111,000 tons in the shipping that has arrived since the opening of navigation, and of \$45,399 in the revenue of the metropolitan port of Canada. All due, the Patriot says, to the National Policy!

—Advices from Quebec state that the political situation in the Province is practically unaltered. There is no truth in the reports of differences between Governor Masson and his cabinet. An early session of the legislature is probable.

—The meeting at New Haven is reported to have been a great success for the Hon. Mr. Campbell; and the Secretary reports that "it is the opinion of everyone that the Liberal-Conservative candidate will poll a larger vote at this election than at the last."

—What sense would there be in electing Hon. Neil McLeod and Patrick Blake to support the Government in the Lower House, and then electing Mr. Thomas Walker Dodd to oppose the Government in the Upper?

Our Civic Rulers in Session.

THE regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening. His Worship Mayor Haviland, His Honor Recorder Fitzgerald, and all the members of the Board were present.

After the transaction of some preliminary business, the petition of Judge Reddin, John Bolger and others asking that a sewer be built and an electric light placed on Water Street east, near the railway station, was read.

A considerable amount of discussion ensued. Councillor Haszard moved that a committee of three be appointed to look into the matter of the construction of the drain and report at the next meeting of the Council.

This resolution was carried and Councillors Haszard Kelly and Morris were appointed the committee. The petition of Messrs Owen Connolly, James Byrne, Thomas Morris and Francis McKenna, asking for a return of fees paid under the Liquor License Act, was next read.

Councillor Kelly moved that the petition be referred to the Recorder for his opinion; said opinion to be given at the next regular meeting of Council.—Carried.

W. H. Finlay's petition asked that certain moneys paid by him in the prosecution of a recent suit in the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court be returned.

Councillor Crabbe moved that the prayer of the petition be granted.—Carried.

Michael Egan, in his petition, objected to the cutting down of his bill for work on pumps and wells after his contract with the city had expired. He asked that the amount of the original bill be paid.

After considerable discussion, and receiving a suggestion on the subject from the Recorder, Councillor Crabbe moved that the Clerk be authorized to make a legal tender to Mr. Egan of the amount of the bill as passed by Council.—Carried.

The written opinion of the Recorder, with reference to the collection of tolls outside the market place, was here read. His Honor's opinion is that under the present market-by-law tolls cannot be collected outside the market grounds.

Councillor A. A. McLean gave notice that at the next regular meeting he would introduce a by-law relating to the collection of market tolls inside the city limits.

Councillor A. A. McLean, from the committee appointed to see about the extension of Alley Street, reported that the committee had looked into the matter and that Mr. Alley had offered to dedicate the street to the city, and Mr. Large had offered to sell his portion of the right of way for \$800. He thought the present time more favorable than any other for the extension, and recommended that Mr. Large's right of way be purchased, provided the residents of the street purchase that of Mr. White.

Councillor Crabbe moved that the report be received.—Carried.

The Mayor informed the Council that Mr. P. Cullen had offered to purchase the McQuaid property for \$200. The matter was discussed but no action was taken.

Councillor A. A. McLean said that as the contract with the Charlottetown Waterworks Co. had apparently fallen through he moved that the tender committee be authorized to call for tenders for the construction of said waterworks.

The usual discussion followed the resolution, and the matter was held over for further consideration at the special meeting to be held on Monday evening next.

Council adjourned at 10.45.

The St. John Telegraph says: Capt. Innes, of the brig Nyanza, cables from Sagua in Cuba that his vessel is ashore at Coconeras reef, in the Gulf of Mexico, and will probably be a total loss. The Nyanza is a vessel of 200 tons, and hailed from Liverpool. N. S. James C. Bartling of that place being managing owner. She was built at Casempec, P. E. I., in 1878. The hull was insured by Messrs. Whitaker Bros., offices for \$2,000; Messrs. M. & T. B. Robinson's for \$2,575, and the Nova Scotia Marine Company, Halifax, for \$2,650. Messrs. Robinson also hold a policy of \$500 on freight. There is another policy of \$1,000 on the freight in England.
