Well Known Souris Man Dies In Ch'town Hospital

Funeral services will be held today at St. Alexis Church, 7010 Bay, for Valerius Angelo MacDonald, 74, who died suddenly Sunday in the Charlottetown Hospital.

Mr. MacDonald was a retired farmer about 30 years of age, public servant in this province. Besides serving as Engineer for Kings' County on various occasions, his activities with the provincial government included the organization and implementation, as chief surveyor, of the provincial survey by the Lambert Conformal projection system.

He was commissioned by the province of British Columbia as land surveyor in 1944, and by the province of P.E.I. in 1945. He was also assistant engineer for the Canadian National Railway on P.E.I.

Mr. MacDonald was born in Souris West, P.E.I., the son of Mr. and Mrs. Archibald J. MacDonald. He was married in 1924.

He was predeceased in 1946 by a son, Ian, and a daughter, Isabelle. He is survived by his wife, six sons, Archie, Leonard, Ontario; Sydney, Halifax; Rogers, Charlottetown; and Angus, Leonard and Ronald at home, and four daughters, Catherine, Mrs. Harold Miller, Charlottetown, Mrs. (Gregory) Tozer, Seattle, Washington; and six Richmond, Virginia, and Susan grandchildren.
