THE MEDICAL COUNCIL OF P. E. ISLAND.

STIPENDIARY Magistrate Fitzgerald gave written judgment in the case against Dr.  
Baynes, dismissing the summons with costs against the Medical Council. The Magistrate  
held that the defendant, being a regular qualified Medical Practitioner resident in the City  
(Charlottetown) and registered under the Medical Act of the Province, could not be guilty,  
and could visit his country patients as heretofore.

## A MILLIONAIRE TRAMP.

Dramatic Adventures of an  
American in Europe.

New York, Feb. 1. A tramp, associated  
with ragged clothing, and bearing the  
general appearance of a tramp, Alexander  
Voulin, a Napa City, (Cal.) millionaire  
was landed at his large office yesterday,  
with 485 Italian, from the steamer Eur-  
gumpia from Naples, and told of a Euro-  
pean trip, taken for pleasure and health,  
which almost resulted in his death, after  
he had been first robbed and sent to  
prison as a vagrant. On landing Mr.  
Voulin was registered, and then went to  
the Custom House and presented a letter  
of introduction, which he carried from  
the United States Consul at Marseille to  
Collector Erhardt, telling the story of  
his trials and tribulations. The Consul  
asked that he be assisted to his home,  
which the Collector did.

Voulin's story is that about five months  
ago he left his paternal residence and  
cruised in Napa City by advice of his  
physicians and went to Italy for the good  
of his health. With him he took \$5,000  
in gold currency, and over a dozen letters  
of introduction from Californian and New  
York correspondents of their correspondents  
at the other side.

He reached Italy safely, and after  
making inquiries for some time and mak-  
ing a long stay in Genoa, he landed  
at a place which described in glowing  
colors the beauties of Monte Carlo. He  
decided to visit the place, and one night  
packed his grip-sack. This done, he went  
out for a stroll and was waylaid, beaten  
and relieved of his money, jewelry,  
letters of introduction, and over 500, but  
and without. He was found in the  
street by one of the police, and  
was being removed to a hospital when he  
came to his senses, and instructed the  
people to carry him to his home. Efforts  
were made to catch the robbers, but  
nothing was recovered.

He concluded that he could not live  
at his expensive lodgings, so he started to  
beg his way to Nice, eating the food that  
he received from the passants. On arrival  
at the health resort and resort city, Mr.  
Voulin thought at last he was in the  
hands of friends. Again he was mistaken,  
for when the police caught sight of the  
dirty, ragged and unshaven fellow, he  
was arrested as a tramp and sentenced to  
thirty days in prison. He was taken to  
the Judge that he was an honest man,  
but the official refused to pay any atten-  
tion to him. Even when he told the story  
of the robbery they laughed and jeered at  
him.

He served his term and then travelled  
to Marseille, where application was  
made to the American Consul with a heavy  
response and he was shipped to New  
York.

The Bible on Strong Drink.  
A correspondent of the Alliance Record  
regrets the widespread misconception re-  
specting the teaching of the Bible in re-  
gard to intoxicating drinks. He says:  
"The teachings of the Bible respecting  
intoxicating drinks are strangely mis-  
read, in a matter of deep regret, but not  
of wonder to those who remember similar  
ignorance or perversity with reference to  
the almighty question; and even now no  
one believes the Bible to support that in-  
stitution. So in the time drawing night  
will no one credit the approval by Scrip-  
ture of the use of intoxicating drink, and  
the will the chief reproach against civil-  
ization, not to speak of Christianity, be a  
thing of the past. As Dr. F. R. Lee  
terse puts it, 'The proposition is which  
the intelligent teetotaler affirms and be-  
lieves to be impregnable in regard to  
Bible teaching are the following:—That  
Bible history and biography record and  
reveal the salutary and sinful conse-  
quences of the use of intoxicating drink.  
That in ancient times a wine was certainly  
in use which is described as a poison to  
both body and soul; a wine that was at  
once a mocker, a defrauder and a de-  
ceiver. That another wine was also  
in use which cheers but not inebriates,  
such as Pharaoh used, which cometh out  
of the earth, and like that of Cana, de-  
serves the name of good wine. That per-  
sonages selected by God for special or  
pre-eminence services, and even some-  
times their parents, were forbidden the  
use of all wine, and in some cases of any-  
thing that cometh of the vine, and ex-  
treme teetotalism not needed in this day  
of science. That the first prohibition of  
wine and the first abstinence pledge are  
recorded as coming directly from God.  
That men devoted to work of strength or  
of special angelic messages. That neither  
in the Old nor in the New Testament is  
there a single passage which implies,  
much less verbally expresses, any Divine  
approval of intoxicating wine, or the  
contrary, there are repeated warnings  
against the use of such drinks all through

## Trouble in the Montreal Dry Goods Trade.

MONTREAL, Feb. 2.—Incidental to the  
failure of Wilson & McMillan, a statement  
of assignment has been made upon Mc-  
Ginnis Bros., of Parkhill, Ont. The  
principal creditors are said to be the  
People's Bank of Montreal and Union  
Bank Branch Montreal. It is said the  
liabilities are in the neighborhood of one  
hundred thousand, the assets of the  
firm, Lindsay, Gilmour & Co's failure.  
It has already become apparent in the  
dry goods trade that several firms in  
Montreal, dependent principally on the  
above named firms, have been obliged to  
suspend, and a firm in Toronto, as well  
as general supply accounts outside of  
Montreal, will also be brought down. It  
is estimated the liabilities of these con-  
cerns are one hundred thousand dollars.

## The Weather for February.

The forecast of February promises a  
prevalence of stormy weather, especially  
off the Atlantic coast, along the coast  
of the Gulf Stream, and over the Atlantic  
to the northward of the thirty-fifth para-  
lell, where fresh to strong gales, prin-  
cipally from the westward, will be en-  
countered about once a week. Moreover,  
there will occur less frequently in the Gulf  
of Mexico, but will be of greater violence  
than earlier in the season. The north-  
east trades will be felt further north. Ice-  
bergs and field ice may be encountered  
off Newfoundland from the second  
second parallel to the forty-second  
and fifty-second meridians; little has been  
reported thus far this year, however, and  
we are probable for the present on the  
frequent fogs are indicated on the shores  
of the Grand Banks and George's Shoal.
