In the graduate school there are F. J. McLeod, Charlottetown Royalty, in English and Philology; J. C. Shaw, Stanhope, in classics. Messrs. McLeod and Shaw are also holders of scholarships. Pursuing specialties in the Arts Department are Robert P. Alexander, Stanhope; J. W. Beshout, Murray Harbor; D. D. Hugh, do; A. J. B. Mellish, Charlottetown; G. B. Gordan is in the scientific school. M. L. King, of Tryon, is the only representative of the Province in the medical school. All are doing well—more than keeping up the reputation of the Island.

POLICE COURT.—This morning a man was fined \$5 for fast driving on the streets, and a drunk was disposed of for \$2 or 3 days.

During the month of April, ending to-day, there were 24 convictions for drunkenness, against 14 for the corresponding month of last year, 5 convictions for breach of the Lord's Day Act, 2 convictions for nuisance, 1 conviction for interfering with the police, and 1 conviction for fast driving. During the same period there were six dismissals, viz: 1 for breach of the Lord's Day Act, 3 for nuisance, 1 for malicious injuries to property and 1 for larceny. The receipts during the month amounted to \$123.01.

REDISTRIBUTION.

Changes of Electorate

Five Districts for P. E. Island

Alterations in Other Parts of the Dominion.

OTTAWA, April 30.

Sir John Thompson introduced the Redistribution Bill yesterday, commencing with Prince Edward Island. He pointed out that in the past the county lines had been followed in regard to electoral districts. There were three counties in the Province, and two members for each county, which made a representation of six members in all. As the representation had to be reduced to five, these lines had to be departed from. In future the constituencies would be known as West Prince County, and East Prince County, West Queen's County and East Queen's County, and King's County. The division by population was 21,000 for West Prince County; 20,703 for East Prince County; 22,209 for West Queen's County; 23,466 for East Queen's County, and 21,634 for King's County. So that the division is made in regard to population as near as it is practicable to do so.

Queen's and Shelburne Counties in Nova Scotia are united. One member is provided for St. John City and County, and Queen's and Sanbury are to form one County.

Coming to the Province of Quebec, he said that the larger counties there required more representation than they at present had. Montreal had now three members, with a population of 182,695, and Hochelaga had a population of 20,998, so that the two combined had a population of 203,693, for four members. The bill increases the representation of Montreal from three to five members, and Hochelaga from one to two—making seven members in all. In order to avoid under-representation in these large centres, two parishes were taken off and added to Jacques-Cartier and Laval. The county of Ottawa, owing to its large population, will be divided into two, giving it an additional member. To meet this, we unite Three Rivers and St. Maurice into one constituency, and St. John's and Iberville into one. Napierville will be wiped out altogether and added to Chateaugay and Laprairie and Vercheres are struck out and divided between Chambly and St. Hyacinthe and Richelieu. This makes a decrease of four, which will account for the increases in Montreal, Hochelaga and Ottawa County.

In Ontario, very few changes, he said, had been made. One additional member will be given to the city of Toronto. The western part of Renfrew in the Nipissing District will be added to Eastern Algoma and a new constituency made out of the same, giving two for Algoma. Niagara district is reconstituted. The real change, he said, is that Halimand and Monck have been united into one constituency, and North Wentworth and North Brant into another, which will meet the increases in Toronto and Algoma.

In Manitoba, Marquette is divided into two constituencies, one being called Macdonald, after the late Premier. Provencher remains as it was. Old Selkirk is divided into two ridings, Brandon in the east and Ligar in the west. Selkirk will now be what was Ligar heretofore. Winnipeg remains as before. The only change in British Columbia is the uniting of Yale and Cariboo, and making two districts of New Westminster instead of one—the representation remaining the same.

Anarchists in Spain.

MADRID, April 30. The anarchists at Barcelona have been distributing a manifesto calling on working men to rise and whip out the capitalists and employers. The authorities were openly defied. The police learned of the manifesto and raided every workman's club in the city, arresting a large number of anarchists, who will not be released until after May day.

Terrorizing Paris.

PARIS, April 30. The galleries of the Bourse are closed in consequence of the receipt of a letter threatening to blow up the Bourse. A bomb with a half-burned fuse attached was found in the Rue Fleurus. Two loaded bombs were also found near the Church of St. Denis. The Sub-Prefecture at Esplanon was burned yesterday. The fire is attributed to anarchists.

Great and Fatal Fire.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30. Advice from Japan say that a great fire in Tokio, April 10, caused by a candle overturning, spread through a densely-populated district, and that five thousand buildings were burned. Forty-five persons perished.

British Politics.

LONDON, April 30. In the House of Commons, Clarke's motion in favor of local government for Great Britain and Ireland was rejected by a vote of 74 to 53.

Election in Toronto.

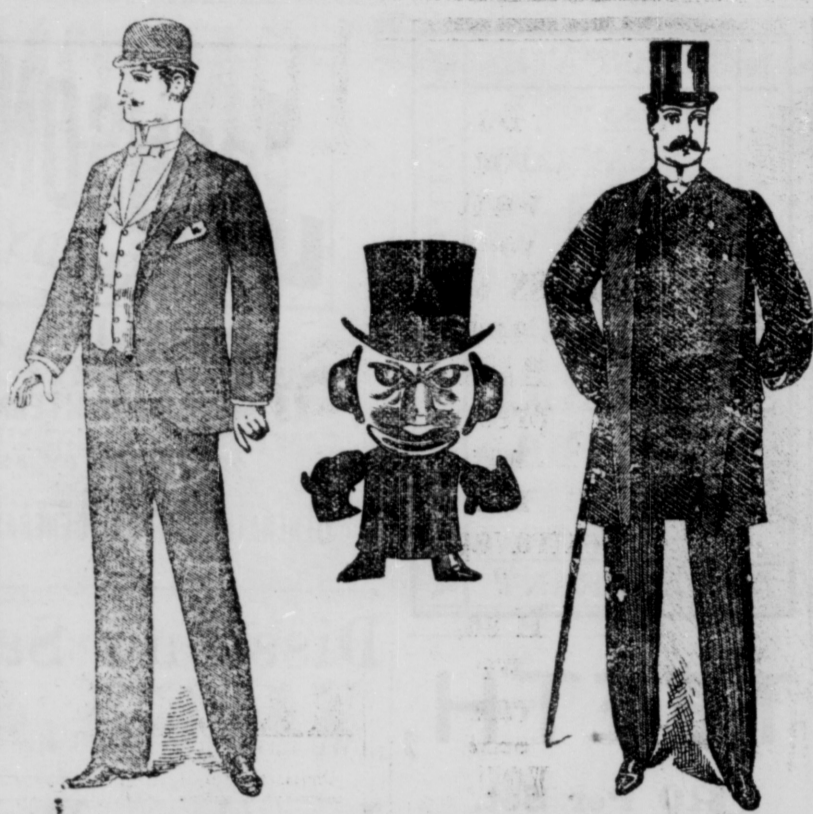
TORONTO, April 30. The Grits captured a local seat in Toronto yesterday, Bigelow being elected. The lethargy of the Conservatives was supreme.
