Budget Figures For Year Presented by City Council

Increased Charges

In this connection he cited the School Board request of an annual \$80,000 this year for teachers in order to maintain the standard of teaching and the named members of the staff on their jobs.

Another factor, he stated was the increase in the property tax which includes garbage collection and disposal as a free service of \$39,000, a jump in street department expenses of \$31,000 to cover snow removal, including sidewalk clearance. Other charges for public works \$18,000.

City Auto Tax Set \$25; Furniture Tax Is Ended

Presentation of the 1964 budget and the passing of the new business occupancy tax by-law highlighted the April meeting of Charlottetown City Council, held last night.

Two letters were received from citizens who had suffered injuries during the past winter on the city's sidewalks and these were turned over to the City Engineer, for action.

Commenting on the sidewalks, Council member MacIver stated that in the budget which had been presented, some \$10,000 had been placed aside for the removal of equipment for sidewalk repair. He said the committee was giving the problem serious thought. If it is feasible, then he had no objections, but maintenance is the ideal long problem.

In his report to the Council on the annual meeting, Council member Walter Cox stated that since the last meeting he had received a large number of letters from people living in the area on Elm Street, above Kirkwood Drive and that the letters came from people dissatisfied with the new zone No. 1 arrangement.

Mayor Gaudin said that he had received a number of calls from "speculators" who had lost money because of the move, but he stated that he brought the Council's concern about the citizens of Charlottetown, and that he would like to make some "quick money."
