The bidding: West North East South 1st Pass 1 4 2 7 Pass 3 3 Pass 4 4

Opening lead - nine of spades. The simplest plays are sometimes the hardest to see. Just as the human eye has a blind spot which prevents one from seeing everything within his theoretical field of vision, so many a declarer discovers to his sorrow that his mind's eye does not encompass everything within its scope.

West leads the nine of spades. Dummy's ten is covered by the jack and South wins with the king. Declarer draws three rounds of trumps and plays the king of diamonds. West takes the ace and returns the deuce of spades.

Dummy's queen is trapped by the A-6 and East wins two spades.

Secret Drug Buying Missions Described

MONTREAL (CP)—A special United States agent Tuesday told of secret meetings with Montreal cafe-owner Giuseppe Pepi Cotroni to buy heroin for re-sale on the illegal drug markets of the U.S.

As a result, he said, narcotics - estimated to be worth \$8,000,000 when sold in diluted capsules in the underworld - came to rest in police hands - neatly packaged and labelled. Patrick Biase, a U.S. treasury agent, was the main witness in the trial of Cotroni, a paunchy Montrealer accused of trafficking in the narcotics. He told of wandering around Montreal night clubs with another U.S. narcotics sleuth - Edward Lawton Smith, who gave his testimony in New York to a special travelling court. PAID OFF Biase said his night club hopping paid off. Cotroni came to see him at a motel where Biase and Smith were staying under false names. "I told him (Cotroni) that I was going into the business to sell heroin," said Biase. "He asked why I went to him." Biase testified that Smith butted into the conversation and said: "We know you are in the rackets and can help."

After discussing the quality of the heroin, Mr. Biase said he told Cotroni he wanted two kilos. "Cotroni said the price would be \$7,000 a kilo on such a small amount." The agent said Cotroni told him the next time they did business it would have to be five kilos or more with the price varying from \$,000 to \$6,500, depending on the New York blackmarket price.

High Labor Costs Cause Concern

MONTREAL (CP)—A. L. Fairley, president of Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, said Tuesday "serious and strong steps" are needed to hold the line on labor costs in the Canadian steel industry. He told a Montreal service club Canada's steel industry will find itself in serious trouble from foreign competition unless there is control of "rapidly rising employment costs."

Mr. Fairley said steel imports even now deprive thousands of Canadians of weekly pay cheques and limit the expansion of Canadian industry. "If we are not careful we will price ourselves out of business. If we don't take some serious and strong steps to hold the line on costs—particularly labor costs—we are going to have a lot of idle equipment and working space in our factories."

The St. Lawrence Seaway has also given foreign competitors a big boost by reducing transportation costs on imports, Mr. Fairly said.

Biase told of second meeting with Cotroni and another man—Rene Robert, a night club waiter. Robert, 31, is also charged with trafficking in narcotics and with conspiring to traffic. He is to be tried later.

He said he got two more kilos for \$14,000 and was given specific instructions on how to get back to the United States. "We were told we should leave for New York at 2 a.m. as the customs were more lax at this time... Cotroni gave me some advice—that I should operate strictly on a cash basis... he mentioned a man who was knocked off owing him \$20,000."

Then Biase testified, something went wrong, Cotroni, he said, had got a tip from New York warning him not to do business with Biase. But a few days later, the deal went through anyway. The trial is to continue today. A defence motion seeking to ban sealed testimony from Biase's fellow agent was not introduced Tuesday as expected.
