THE BULGARIAN SITUATION

Austria to Occupy Bulgaria.

A PRINCE ELECTED.

Gen. Kaulbars III.

LONDON, Nov. 10.

The Chronicle's Vienna correspondent hears of an Anglo-Austrian agreement, based upon Austria's accepting the occupation of Bulgaria by Russia as a casus belli. Russia therefore has given assurance that she has no intention of even partially occupying Bulgaria. It is rumored that Gen. Kaulbars is suffering from nervous excitement, and has had an apopleptic fit.

At to-day's session of the great Sobranje, Prince Waldemar was elected Prince and ruler of Bulgaria, by acclamation. The election created no enthusiasm among the people.

The Infantry Charge Strikers.

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.

There was a collision to-night near Ashland Avenue Bridge, between a crowd of strikers who were gathered to prevent the Packing House employees from passing on their way back at the close of day's work, and a squad of infantry under Lieut. McMillan. The crowd was charged by the squad and forced to retire temporarily, but increasing numbers add to its persistence, and a serious conflict seemed imminent. Finally McMillan gave orders to load with ball cartridge. The crowd thereupon speedily dispersed. No one suffered serious injury.

Brutal Treatment.

HALIFAX, Nov. 10.

The crew of the Quebec bark Joy, from Java, report that on the outward voyage, one of the crew named Pierce, complained about his wages, a dispute arose and the result was that Pierce was placed in irons in which he was kept 75 days and fed on bread and water, when he died. During the time he was in irons, it is alleged that the Captain beat him with a blaying pin and the poor fellow's agonizing cry for mercy only served to enrage the fiendish passions of the Captain. The case is being investigated.

A Wholesale Murderer.

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 10.

Intelligence from Hodgman County tells of a brutal tragedy. Sam Hurple, a hard character, shot his wife and three children and attempted to kill his sister-in-law and another child, but they escaped with severe injuries. He was arrested. At night one hundred armed men overpowered the jailer and took Hurple forth. He was found hanging to a tree next day dead.

Rev. Mr. Currie's Case.

FREDERICTON, Nov. 10.

Among the judgments delivered by Supreme Court this afternoon is *ex parte* D. D. Currie, rule absolute, for prohibiting to prevent the conference from proceeding with a charge made by the Rev. W. Hamilton in 1885, against Rev. D. D. Currie, per Allen, Wetmore, Palmer and Fraser, Tuck and King, dissenting.

Grand Larceny.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 10.

The Grand Jury to-day found an indictment for grand larceny, and for receiving stolen property against David Fotheringham, Adam's express messenger, whose car was robbed of \$80,000 two weeks ago.
