

MISCELLANEOUS.

Sir Robert Peel has written a letter to the Prince of Wales apologizing for his attack on the Prince several months ago in *Vanity Fair*, on the ground that he was very ill when he made it.

The Ottawa Valley is becoming famous for vine culture. A prominent city resident, who only commenced operations two seasons ago, as an amateur, has a vineyard that will yield at least three tons of grapes.

The contract for 35 tons of nuts and screws for the Winnipeg section of the Canada Pacific Railway has been awarded to the Dominion Bolt Company, of Montreal, and for the 700 tons of spikes to Miller Bros. & Mitchell, of the same city.

It would seem that the anti-Chinese Communist party of California received a serious check in the late elections there. The Kearneyites did not show nearly as much strength in the contest as they were expected to manifest.

Truth announces that a week after the prizes of virtue were awarded by the French Academy, one of the winners, who received a prize of £40, with no end of compliments on his merits, got mixed up in an assault case of the worst possible description and taken into custody.

When the *Daily News* telegram from St. Petersburg, announcing that Sir Henry Austen Layard was to be replaced as Ambassador to the Porte by Lord Dufferin, was taken into the Pera Club, the first man who got hold of it, says *Truth*, in the smoking room, exclaimed: "Hooray! we're to have Dufferin!" To which the reply in chorus was: "Thank goodness, we shall have Duffer out then!"

The Chicago banks are so flush of money that they have been able to loan an aggregate of \$3,000,000 in New York on call, since the recent tightness showed itself on Wall street. The rates obtained, so we are advised by the *Chicago Journal of Commerce*, have ranged from four to six per cent. The highest rate paid was on the last loan—\$500,000 on the 28th ult.—six per cent on call, with Government bonds as collateral.

A Washington despatch says:—It is stated at the Treasury Department that the amount of sugar admitted duty free into San Francisco from the Sandwich Islands during August would have paid, if imported from any other country, revenue to the amount of \$150,000. There is reason to believe that sugar is being shipped to the Sandwich Islands, then re-exported, to evade the duties. An investigation is being made.

It is stated that His Grace the Duke of Argyll is to marry the Hon. Mrs. Anson, the eldest daughter of the Bishop of St. Albans, and a niece of the Earl of Dudley, who married in 1863 Colonel the Hon. Augustus Henry Anson, V. B., and M. P. for Lichfield, a brother of the Earl of Lichfield. Colonel Anson died in 1877. The Duke of Argyll's first wife, a sister of the Duke of Sutherland, died suddenly last year. The Duke is now fifty-six and his bride-elect is about twenty years his junior.

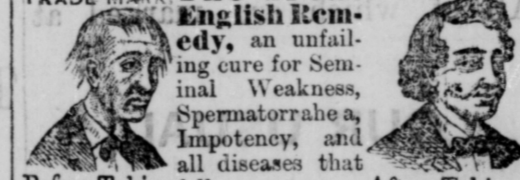
