THE LEE TROUBLE.

Lee Held in Boston.

His Papers Have Disappeared.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 24. Each day brings out some new and radically transaction on behalf of G. Herbert Lee, the ascending lawyer. It is now extremely probable that estates and persons about the city will suffer to the extent of \$100,000. Lee got endorsers for notes on every hand, and used all the cash he could get his hands on for the several estates he was agent for. It is not yet known what course is to be taken. Lee is still detained at Young's hotel, Boston. He says he cannot be brought back. His safe was opened last evening but no papers were found. What has become of all the estate papers, life insurance policies, etc., he held is a mystery.

Was Daigle Murdered?

Outrages at Buctouche

THE AUTHORITIES NOTIFIED.

MONCTON, Aug. 24. A series of outrages are reported from Buctouche, Kent Co., following the drowning of Captain Daigle who, it was believed, was bringing a cargo of smuggled liquor from St. Pierre. First a young man named Sawyer notified the authorities that he had found a quantity of smuggled liquor, and was set upon and beaten. Other outrages followed. A statement of the affairs has been sent to the authorities. There is a suspicion that Captain Daigle was not drowned, but foully murdered before being put in the water; the object of the murder being robbery, as Daigle must have had a large sum on his person.

The Newfield Disaster.

PORT HASTINGS, Aug. 24. The Government steamer La Canadienne has come to the Newfield's assistance. The anchor flukes backing caused the accident to the Newfield. There is now about ten feet of water in the steamer both fore and aft. She is on a very rocky bottom and her starboard side is nearly all crumpled in. If the weather continues fine the ship may be floated off. It is understood that she is so badly damaged as the Ulinda was.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 24. The suspension of the shipping firm of George Tweedy & Co., London, principal operators of the North Atlantic Trident Line of steamships between this port and London, Swansea, Avonmouth, Bristol and Rotterdam, is announced.

An Important Resolution.

LONDON, Aug. 24. Stuart Reunlele, member for Montgomeryshire, chairman of the Welsh party, will introduce in parliament a bill fixing a date after which no vested interest can be created in Welsh dioceses. The measure is forerunner to a bill disestablishing the Church in Wales.

Cabinet Meeting.

OTTAWA, Aug. 24. A cabinet meeting was held yesterday, Messrs. Caron, Costigan, Tupper, Haggart, Dewdney and Oulmet being present. It is understood that routine business only was transacted.

Death of an Islander.

OTTAWA, Aug. 24. James Hughes, of Charlottetown, who fell from a window here during a fit of somnambulism, died yesterday morning. He was engaged here in the Department of Agriculture. The body will be sent home for interment.

Railway Conference at Montreal

MONTREAL, Aug. 24. Mr. Pottinger, of the Intercolonial, arrived here yesterday and had a conference with Mr. Schreiber which lasted all day. The conference is said to refer to retrenchments in the working of the road.

QUEBEC, Aug. 24. Hon. E. Dronne, Conservative member for the Legislative Council, is dead.
