Queen's Visit Promises Great Flurry Of Activity

A great many purely local preparations are underway regarding the visit of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II to P.E.I., although official details of the Royal visit have not yet been announced from Ottawa.

A concentration of approximately 250 accredited news men from two continents will assure top news coverage in press, radio, tv and other news media. Top news men from Britain, Canada and the United States will begin invading the city in preparation for the visit. The mightiest job of all is being done by Charlottetown Police Chief Sierns Webster and his force, RCMP and Superintendent A.S. McNeill and several units of militia.

Problems that will be encountered will be the movement of luggage of the various officers who will be in the city and arrangements for pressmen to move as quickly as possible from one spot to the other as the visit and parades progress. First aid mobile units will be on hand for any emergency.
