

Retail Sales And Profits Higher Than Last Year

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian retail stores are selling goods for more money this year than last, and motor vehicle dealers are making the highest proportionate gains. Motor vehicle dealers made sales of \$290,770,000 in May, a 17.3 per cent increase from May, 1954, the bureau of statistics reported Thursday.

May sales of all retail stores totalled an estimated \$1,200,900,000, a rise of 1.6 per cent from April and an increase of five per cent from May, 1954. Cumulative sales for the first five months of the year were \$4,757,537,000, up 1.8 per cent from the corresponding period of 1954.

Lumber and building material dealers' sales were \$40,177,000, up 15 per cent from May, 1954, department store sales were \$85,370,000, up 10.1 per cent; and grocery and combination store sales were \$195,096,000, up 1.5 per cent.

Variety stores, garages and filling stations and the miscellaneous group also showed slight gains.

Sales were lower in hardware, fuel, drug, jewelry and clothing stores except for women's clothing which increased 0.7 per cent.

Cumulative sales for the first five months of the year were higher for department stores, 5.8 per cent; grocery and combination stores, 5.5 per cent; lumber and building material dealers, 5.4 per cent; variety stores, 5.2 per cent; fuel dealers, 4.8 per cent; and motor vehicle dealers, 4.6 per cent.

St. David's Anniversary

On Sunday, July 24, St. David's United Church, Georgetown, is observing its 13th anniversary. This church ranks as one of the oldest churches in the province, having had continuous worship since 1837, the year of the accession of Queen Victoria. Grants of land were given in her name and signed by the governor of the Island to the Presbyterian congregation in Georgetown. This presupposes an organization of a church prior to 1837.

During these years a great number of ministers who have laboured in the charge have become well known names throughout the church, namely: Rev. George Grant, who became the Principal of Queens University, Kingston, Ontario; Rev. John Mackinnon, the father of Dr. Clarence Mackinnon of Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax, N.S.

C.P.R. Orders Freight Cars

MONTREAL (CP)—Canadian Pacific Railway Thursday announced it has placed orders with four Canadian firms for 1,640 new freight cars. Delivery is scheduled to be made this year.

Contracts were awarded to the Eastern Car Co., Glasgow, N.S., for 400 drop-end gondola cars; Marine Industries, Sorel, Que., for 40 covered hopper cars; National Car Corporation, Hamilton, Ont., for 200 triple-topper cars and 500 box cars; and Canadian Car and Foundry Co., Montreal, for 200 flat cars and 500 box cars.

Cost of the order was not announced.

New Zealand Tax Payers Get Broad Concessions

WELLINGTON, N.Z. (AP)—Tax cuts totalling \$11,000,000 were granted in the budget presented by Finance Minister Jack Watts in Parliament Thursday night. The principal reduction is a rebate of 20 per cent for all taxpayers, excluding companies, but this rebate cannot total more than \$75 for any taxpayer.

Some commodities—principally bicycles, clocks, medicinal preparations and drugs—have been freed from the 20 per cent sales tax.

Cuts are made in death duties. Succession duty is abolished and in its place a single estate duty is to be levied. The budget introduces instalment buying regulations for the first time in New Zealand to limit spending on consumer goods.
