—Mr. M. Watt has his moments of weakness. In one of them he introduced a bill prohibiting the sale of cigarettes to juveniles. Upon which the Montreal Gazette remarks that Mr. Watt's statute book may be the embodiment of Christian and political wisdom, but it cannot be made to take the place in the family of the maternal slipper and the paternal rod.

—Mr. Gishorne, Superintendent of Government telegraphs, has received a letter from M. signor Bosse, at Point aux Esquimaux, Labrador, under date February 1, in which he says there is very little snow upon the coast of Labrador and little ice in it; consequently the seal hunting during November and December between Mutton Bay and Blanc Sablon was very good; also that the catch of fur was good, and no distress was known throughout the district.

—Mr. F. W. Fearman, a dealer in pork, has written a letter to the Toronto Globe showing that the influence of unrestricted reciprocity would be upon that business. A table which Mr. Fearman has prepared of actual prices paid by him since he began business in 1865, shows that whereas his purchases have increased from 500 to 39,000 hogs annually, he is able to pay farmers very much better prices than those which are paid in the United States, much better prices than were paid before the new duties were imposed in 1879, and much better prices than would be possible now if the barrier between the United States and Canada were thrown down.

—The death of Captain George L. Burchell, of Sydney, at Pulask Springs, where he had gone for the benefit of his health, is deeply regretted in Cape Breton and by all who knew him everywhere. As commander of the Bras D'O. Navigation Co. he was largely instrumental in bringing the Island before the notice of tourists, so that now it has become the most popular resort in the Maritime Provinces.

—He was indeed one of nature's noblemen. He was a man of strong attachments. He loved his native Island as man loves his own flesh and blood, and in him Cape Breton has lost a true and devoted citizen.

#### Horse Notes.

(From Turf, Farm and Home.)  
 Russian horses are controlled more by the voice than by the rule.  
 Owners of standard-bred colts or fillies that are not registered, should attend to getting them registered at once as it will add much to their selling value.  
 The number of breeders in New England who are feeding large quantities of grain to stock on which there is no gain is, undoubtedly, very large.  
 C. W. Williams announces that Allerton will meet any one stallion in a race the first week in August, and will meet all stallions during the second week on the track at Independence, Iowa, but on no account will he ever again beat the cars.  
 The Legislature of Tennessee has passed an act, one section of which is the following: "Any person, firm, company or association who shall knowingly record or post any false or fraudulent pedigree shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof be fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$100."

This is from a reliable California source and almost bears an official stamp, viz.: The Breeder and Sportman: Nearly all the turf writers in America have written that Electioneer is the sire of 100 or 101 trotters in the 230 list and every mail brings in these misstatements, which it is high time to correct. Electioneer sired only 92 trotters with authenticated records of 230, and that is all events, without claims. Electioneer's record Mr. Lothrop refuses to claim; Lilly Mak is by Auctioneer, and not by the great departed sire, while we are not certain about Miss Naudie's record being an authenticated one.  
 The great interests that are invested in the breeding of horses can be judged from the summary of transactions for 1891. During the year the number of thoroughbreds which sold for \$5,000 or over was 51, and the number of trotters 14. No less than 1,562 thoroughbreds and 4,064 trotters were sold at auction during the year, the thoroughbred bringing \$1,528,525, an average of \$1,017, and the trotters reaching a total of \$1,731,895, an average of \$429. The total of both thoroughbreds and trotters sold at auction was 5,626, and the total amount of the sales \$3,260,420, making a general average of \$501. The increase of the number of horses sold over the preceding year was 1,271, and the increase in the total money realized was \$12,579. There was a decrease in the general average of \$167.

The darker the plug the greater the moisture, and many prefer the dark in each caddy, however, the preference for either can be met.
