Markets

New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market last week broke through to a new high, hesitated briefly, and then again dashed ahead to another record peak.

That has been the pattern of the market for the last 10 months with only a few exceptions.

From time to time there have been warnings that a major reaction is just around the corner, and in recent weeks these warnings have been underlined heavily by some brokers.

Nevertheless, the stock market continues to roll up records.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks last week gained \$1.80 and closed at \$130.00. That is the highest mark that the average has reached since Oct. 22, 1929.

The five most active issues last week on the American stock exchange were: Ford Motor of France off 1/4 at 1 1/4 on 99,000 shares; New Iridia Mining up 1/2 at 2 1/2; East Dome Mines up 1/8 at 3 1/4; Electric Bond and Share up 1/4 at 23 1/4; and Coastal Caribbean Oil unchanged at 2 1/4.

The five most active issues last week on the New York stock exchange were: Radio Corp. up 1/4 at 32 on 145,200 shares; New York Shipbuilding up 2 1/2 at 19 1/2; U. S. Steel up 1/4 at 51 1/4; International Telephone up 1/4 at 19 1/4; and RKO Theatres up 1/4 at 8.

Canadian stocks closed higher. McIntyre and Distillers Seagram both advanced 1/2, Dome Mines and International Nickel each gained 3/4.

U. S. Steel

CLEVELAND (AP)—Vacations and the July 4 holiday cut steel production 7.5 points last week to 59.5 per cent of the nation's rated capacity—the lowest mark of the year.

Steel Magazine, reporting that today, added that metalworking executives expect the rate to go up—enough so that business would be 10 per cent greater in the second half year than in the first.

Production had been climbing before the holiday-vacation season and had reached 73.5 per cent of capacity, only two or three points less than the high mark for the year which was set in January.

Rates were off 22.5 points to 66 per cent of capacity at Wheeling, 12 to 60 per cent at Youngstown, 11 to 60 at Chicago, 10 to 55 at St. Louis, 2 to 62 at Cincinnati, 2 to 55 in the Middle Atlantic district, 2 to 48 in New England, 8 to 59 at Pittsburgh and 1 to 57.5 at Cleveland.

At Detroit, production increased 26 points to 50 per cent. Operations were unchanged at 86 per cent in the Far West and 76 per cent at Birmingham.

Pay boosts won by United Steelworkers (CIO) were reflected for the first time in the magazine's price composite on finished steel.

Expect Record Season For Port Of Churchill

CHURCHILL, Man. (CP)—The greatest shipping season in the history of this northern port is in prospect this summer with 23 vessels already scheduled for the three-month season.

The bookings are a record for this date—there may be more later.
