Dispute Over Hole-boring Causes Tieup

BIRKENHEAD, England (Reuters) - In British shipbuilding, woodworkers handle wood and metal workers handle metal and their unions jealously guard their rights.

But what happens when a job to be done is half-wood and half-metal? At the Cammel Laird shipyard here, the answer is a strike. The question has vexed unions, employers and chiefs of the Trades Union Congress. Now Labor Minister Iain Macleod has promised an inquiry.

The problem has brought work on four half-finished American cargo ships to a standstill. Five hundred men left work six months ago in the dispute, 500 have been dismissed, and nearly 10,000 are threatened with unemployment if the yard closes.

The wood and metal clash comes into the picture when the wood is attached to aluminum for insulation purposes on ships after being launched. Who should bore the holes in the attached wood and metal - woodworkers or metal workers?

Both claim the privilege. The dispute blew up after launching of a United Fruit Company's banana boat.

MOY CLOSE YARD Woodworkers first started boring the holes until the metal workers claimed it was their job. Management decided it was the woodworkers' job.

Then the shipwright's union stepped in and said it didn't like management making the decision. The woodworkers went on strike.

For six months, the dispute and strike has dragged on. No one seems able to solve the problem. A Cammel Laird official said: "It's quite possible the yard may have to close if the dispute goes on."

In desperation, the union took the matter to Macleod, who said he would treat the matter "as one of the greatest urgency" and promised "a very early answer."

The 10 building slips in the yard can't be cleared until vessels moved out and that can't happen until somebody drills the holes.

PHONE FIRMS NEED AID

TORONTO (CP) - Ontario's small telephone companies are rapidly being absorbed by larger organizations because they cannot raise rising costs, an official of the telephone authority said Friday.

Chairman A. H. Rogers told the Ontario legislature's committee on government commissions some of the 350 private companies now operating may have to get municipal aid to stay in business. Some of them serviced less than 50 subscribers.

New York Stock Market Drove Ahead Strongly Last Week

NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market drove ahead strongly last week on heavy volume to score repeated record highs.

A week ago the market reached a record high mark in a rally that ended a three-month period of reaction and consolidation.

At that time the question was whether there was enough buying power left to keep the bull market rolling or whether it had exhausted itself.

Before the week was out, there was no doubt that the market had plenty of spirit and pep. Buyers flocked in to get on the bandwagon of rising prices.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced \$3.80 on the week and closed at \$185.40, a historic high. Volume was the highest in six months.

The five most active issues on the New York stock exchange were Westinghouse Electric up 2 1/2% at 61 1/2; National Distillers up 1 1/2% at 23 1/2; General Motors up 1 1/2% at 46; Armour up 2 1/2% at 20 1/2, and

International Telephone up 2 at 34 1/2. Canadian issues on both the New York and the American stock exchange generally followed the higher trend. On the big board, higher issues over the five-day period were Aluminum Ltd. up 3/4 at 120, International Nickel up 1 1/4 at 34 1/2, Distillers Seagram up 1 1/2 at 39 1/2, Dome Mines up 1 1/2 at 15 1/2, Granby Mining up 1 1/2 at 20, Hudson's Bay Mining up 1 at 6 1/2, and Walker Gooderham up 2 1/2 at 73 1/2. McIntyre was off 1 1/4 at 93 1/2.

Higher on the American stock exchange were Eureka Mines up 1/2 at 1 1/2, Molybdenite up 1/2 at 19-16, Fargo Oil up 1/2 at 2 1/2, Great Sweet Grass Oil up 1/2 at 5 1/2, Sapphire Petroleum up 1/2 at 2 7/8 - 16, Brazilian Traction slipped 1/2 to 6 1/2 and Preston East Dome oils dropped 7-16 to 7 1-16. Unchanged were Canadian Marconi at 5 1/2, Jupiter Oils at 2 1-16 and Wilrich Petroleum at 1/2.

Sweden has agricultural produce high on her import list but outside of rye took no appreciable amounts of these products from Canada last year. Wheat and coarse grains remain under Swedish import control.

That is the advice of L. A. Campeau, Canadian commercial secretary in Stockholm. Writing in the trade department publication "Foreign Trade" he says the Swedes are quality minded.

Their concern with quality "naturally applies to imports, a fact which Canadian companies who are anxious to enter the Swedish market should remember.

"Packaging is also important. Even if an article is in itself high quality but is packed in an unsuitable way, it may be difficult to sell."

ADVERSE BALANCE Canadian exports to Sweden have climbed since easing of dollar restrictions in 1954. They had a value of \$7,622,000 in 1955 compared with \$5,500,000 in the previous year. Leading exports are rye, auto tires, iron ingots, aluminum, nickel, asbestos, resins, drugs and chemicals.

But Canada still has an adverse trade balance with Sweden. It took \$11,102,000 worth of Swedish goods in the first 11 months of 1955 compared with \$8,299,000 in the same period of the previous year. Among top imports are metal products, machinery, roller bearings, electrical equipment and mechanical office equipment such as adding
