of 81 to indicate there was guilt by several troops doing the sentence could have an effect on promotion for Cndr. Lelr. He is on the "short list" and a promotion to captain was considered imminent before the court martial proceedings.

The court could have imposed a severe reprimand, which is still less serious than a loss of command. It is felt that Lelr would be the lightest sentence that could have been imposed.

The sentence must be reviewed by the advocate court general in Ottawa, but this is considered to be only a formality.

Mr. Mackenzie told reporters that he may enter an appeal on the grounds that Judge Advocate Group Capt. J. A. Hollie put "too narrow an interpretation on the meaning of 'mens rea.'"

Pall Of Despair Intensifies Since Reds Built Berlin Wall

LEIPZIG, East Germany (AP)—The pall of despair has intensified in East Germany in the seven months since the Communists built their wall across Berlin.

This reporter, permitted to visit East Germany for Leipzig's spring trade fair, found gloom and hopelessness in some cases. A dreary conformity showed through the artificial atmosphere of festivity created during the fair.

Leipzigers in conversations expressed fear that Walter Ulbricht, East Germany's top Communist, has entrenched his position in the last few months. Many of his fellow citizens voice little hope of a step in the daily pressure to conform to his concepts of communism.

Ulbricht is regarded as a Stalinist whose repressive meas-

is adjusted to set up waves of any specific length and height desired, to test conditions in periods of comparative calm and in periods of storm. An electrically-operated winch adjusts water levels in the model to simulate the flow of the tide and in some cases the wind flow in and out.

The model was set up early this year and so far only a few tests have been run off. It is expected that it will be kept in operation over the next several months and this will result in a gradual shifting of the sand and changes in the pattern of the current at the tide flows in and out.

From this information, engineers of the Department of Public Works expect to be able to determine what kind of a bridge will be most suited to the conditions, what sort of breakwaters or other protection will be needed, what stresses and strains will be placed on the bridge and its approaches. It is also important that as little interference as possible be created for the fishing industry in the area.

SPECIAL CENTRE PORTION

Present thinking is to have a fairly low-level structure, but with a centre portion which can be raised to permit the passage of the DPW dredges and 100 g liners of the fishermen.

This week, Queens' members of parliament, Hon. Angus MacLean and Hugh MacQuarrie, along with national parks chief E.M. Stronach and engineers from the public works department, visited one NRC model.

Pickup Expected In Steel Demand

CLIVELAND (AP)—Demand for steel will pick up during April now that consumers are convinced the United Steelworkers and management are far apart in bargaining on a new contract, Steel Magazine said.

The metalworking weekly said small consumers hold the clue to steel orders in the second quarter. Buy users, such as auto and appliance manufacturers, started to build up stocks months ago.

"Smaller consumers will have to decide which is worse—paying for insurance that may not be needed or suffering the penalties that a strike might impose," Steel said. "They can't play the waiting game much longer."

The magazine said prospects still favor a peaceful labor settlement but it won't come as quickly or as easily as hoped when negotiations were started. Steel said production this week will be about the same as the 2,350,000 tons it estimates the industry poured last week.
