BIRCHALL MUST HANG.—An Ottawa despatch says that a cabinet council, after due consideration, has decided that Birchall must be executed on the 14th inst. The cabinet was unanimous in its opinion as to the guilt of Birchall, and consequently decided that the law should take its course.

BAZAAR.—The ladies of St. Joseph's Solidarity are making extensive preparations for their grand bazaar to be held on the 25th and 27th of this month. Among the curios on exhibition will be the boat used by the late Bishop McClellan in some of his early voyages to the mainland.

PRICE OF POTATOES.—The Campbellton, N. B., Pioneer says: Potatoes are selling at Petit Roche and Belledune at eighty cents per barrel; at this time last year they could be bought for sixty cents. Evidently the McKinley Bill is helping instead of starving our farmers, as the shipments are all sent to the United States.

FROM BOSTON.—The steamer Carroll, Capt. Brown, with a full cargo of flour, tobacco, and general merchandise, arrived here from Boston early on Saturday evening. The passengers were Mrs. E. Chandler, Miss O'Donnell, James Doyle, Mrs. Livingstone, Mrs. E. F. Parly, and George Gorveatt. She will have a full cargo of potatoes on return.

The interesting ceremony was performed on the 30th of October, and Mr. and Mrs. Bagnall will be "at home" at their residence, Parker Street, Northfield, Mass., after the 15th Dec. ATTENDANCE AT DALHOUSIE.—The number of undergraduates at Dalhousie College this session shows a very gratifying increase over that of last year. The undergraduates in arts number 107, distributed among the years as follows: Seniors 29, juniors 24, sophomores 25, freshmen 27. Of these 8 are from Nova Scotia, 17 from P. E. Island, 8 from New Brunswick, 2 from Maine, 1 from British Columbia, and 1 from Bermuda. The number of general's so far registered is 54. This number is greatly increased by the opening of the medical college, whose students register as general's in Dalhousie.

ANOTHER MODEL.—Mr. Manley, of the steamer Carroll, has a splendidly-wrought model of the sloop yacht Volunteer, the winner of the America cup and the champion ship of the world, on exhibition in the show window of Johnson's drug store.

The Volunteer is owned by General Payne, of Boston. Her length over all is 106 feet. The model represents the Volunteer lying at anchor. It is a foot and a half long, four and a half inches broad, and two feet high. The workmanship throughout is excellent. Mr. Manley has already made six models, viz, two of the Mayflower, two of the Puritan, and two of the Volunteer.

BLAZE AT PICTOU.—There was a big fire at Pictou on Saturday morning. It started in the police station about three o'clock, and before it could be brought under control some sixteen or twenty buildings were destroyed. The loss is roughly estimated at \$50,000. The buildings destroyed include the Standard office, Meagher's stables, Carson's warehouse, mill and lumber yard and Pringle's warehouse. The police station was locked at the time of the fire, and before the one prisoner—a Norwegian sailor—could be rescued, he was burned to a crisp. It was the cries of the unfortunate sailor in his cell as the smoke and flames enveloped him, that aroused a man living across the street who gave the alarm. Before the fire could be got under control an engine and fire company had to be brought from New Glasgow.

THE PICTOU FIRE.

Man Burned to Death.

Property Destroyed.

PICTOU, Nov. 8. About three o'clock this morning fire broke out in the lock-up on South Market Wharf, and a strong southerly wind prevailing, spread with great rapidity, destroying twenty buildings. The lock-up contained one prisoner, a Norwegian sailor, who was burned to death. The destroyed places are the lock-up, Mr. Harper's warehouse, Carson's factory and their four buildings, the Standard office, Alex. Paterson's, John Brown's, Mrs. Kitchen's, Chas. & Crowe's, John Pringle & Son's, D. Sutherland's, W. Carson's, James Hislop & Son's and residence, and Miss Meagher's. The loss is estimated at between \$50,000 and \$60,000, with insurance about \$25,000.

Nova Scotia News.

HALIFAX, Nov. 9. Two young men report to the police that on Thanksgiving Day they were enticed into the military canteen and given enough liquor to intoxicate them, and that they were robbed, the one of a gold watch given to his father in 1865 by the American Government, and the other a silver watch. The loser of the gold watch took the matter in his own hands and by the payment of \$15 blackmail got it back from the soldier. The silver watch is yet missing.

Principal MacVicar, of Montreal, preached to a large audience at the anniversary of Park Street Church to-day.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 9. Lieut. Gordon and Capt. McElhinney have been appointed to hold an enquiry regarding the recent disaster to the steamer Napoleon III.

Instructions have been issued from the Department of Fisheries that the protection in cruisers be sent to their winter quarters.

The lighthouse at Gaspe having been burnt, a temporary light has been ordered for the remainder of the season of navigation.

The British Farmer's delegates are expected to return here to-morrow, and will be banqueted by leading citizens to-morrow evening.

The Murderer of Benwell.

WOODSTOCK, Nov. 9. Birchall now admits that he was an accessory before and after the fact, and those who know him say that the only thing that prevents him from making a clean breast of the affair is that he is ashamed to confess that he shot Benwell from behind.

Free and Compulsory Education.

MONTREAL, Nov. 9. The report that a bill providing for free and compulsory education is about to be introduced in the Quebec Legislature has evidently alarmed the clergy, as La Semaine, the religious organ of the Archbishop of Montreal, is out to day protesting against the idea of the state taking the place of the church in the instruction of children.

Election of a President.

MONTREAL, Nov. 9. At a meeting of the Dominion Commercial Travellers' Association, held last evening, Fred Hughes, of Coverhill, was elected president by acclamation.

Col. Patton, so well known in the Lower Provinces, is likely to be the successful candidate for vice-president.

England and Portugal.

LONDON, Nov. 9. The English and Portuguese governments have agreed upon a modus vivendi to remain in force for six months pending negotiations between the two governments regarding the disputed territory in Africa. The agreements made since August 20th with native chiefs by British agents are annulled.

Obituary.

MONTREAL, Nov. 9. James Stewart, for many years managing director and a moving spirit in the Montreal Herald, died to-day, after a long illness.

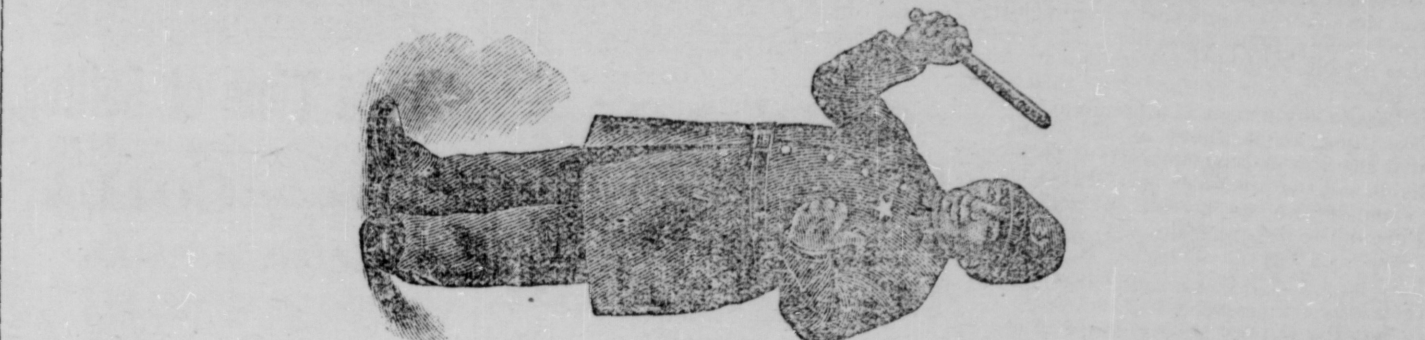
