Damage by Floods in China.  
Tientsin, Oct. 23.—The Rev. R. P. Mc-  
Kay, Foreign Mission secretary of the  
Presbyterian church, received a letter  
yesterday from the Rev. S. W. Harvey  
Grant and Mr. S. Linmo, who are at  
Homo, China. They report that they  
were on the point of beginning a tour of  
the interior when heavy rains began to  
come down and continue for several days.  
The water had risen so high that the banks  
of the two rivers had burst and the water  
country was flooded and the town inundated.  
They state that the autumn crop was  
just about ready for harvest and is totally  
destroyed, and what makes the matter  
worse, the early crops have been a partial  
failure through rains. With regard to the  
work they state that it is going along  
smoothly, and that everything is quiet  
and peaceable.
