LONG ISLAND CITY, N. Y., May 27. Col. C. B. Waring, a wealthy resident, returned home under the influence of liquor last night and began to abuse his wife, George E. Freund, his brother-in-law, who resided in an adjoining house, called out over the fence to know the cause of the disturbance, when Waring fired at him, the ball entering his left eye and causing instant death. The murderer was committed for trial.

Discouraging Reports.

NEW ORLEANS, May 27. A despatch from Baton Rouge to the Picayune says discouraging accounts of the situation in Red River Valley are received. According to advices the country lying below Caddo and Bosses hills for nearly 180 miles down from a point five miles below Shreve Port is under water at an average depth of four feet. Five places belonging to Senator Robson, and two hundred belonging to other planters are overflowed. The cotton producers of the submerged area is estimated at 75,000 bales.

More About the Floods.

GALVESTON, TEXAS, May 27. The News says reports from all over the State reveal that "wash-outs" have occurred on all lines of Texas railroads. The east ern approach to Bremond narrow gauge railway bridge, across San Ja Cinto river, was carried away, and people are fleeing to high lands. Large numbers of cattle have been drowned and stock of all kinds has suffered.

A Qualified Vote of Confidence.

LONDON, May 27. At a Liberal meeting in Leeds to-day, a resolution was adopted expressing "confidence in the motives and integrity of Gladstone." The word "wisdom" was also in the resolution as originally offered, but this was too much for the meeting, and they struck it out.

Murder Most Foul.

OTTAWA, May 27. Edward Kerr, a corporation laborer, was found murdered on the sidewalk in Toronto yesterday. Five men and a woman have been arrested on suspicion.

The Egyptian Conference.

LONDON, May 27. In the House of Commons to-day, Mr. Gladstone declared that the Egyptian Conference would be limited to the discussion of the financial situation.

A By-Law for allowing a rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Income for the Current Year.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows: 1. A discount at the rate of two and one-half per cent. shall be allowed to all Taxpayers who shall, on or before the thirtieth day of June, A. D. 1884, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Incomes. (Signed) DAVID R. M. HOOPER, Mayor of City of Charlottetown. [L. S.] A. A By-Law for levying and Specifying the Rate of an Assessment on Real Estate and Income in the City of Charlottetown.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows: 1. The rate of assessment for the year commencing the 1st of January, A. D. 1884, and ending the 31st of December, A. D. 1884, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one cent and one-tenth of a cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate within the City of Charlottetown, according to the valuation of such Real Estate as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in their valuation rolls of such Real Estate, made, and only returned by them, on the ninth day of April, A. D. 1884. 2. The rate of assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1884, and ending 31st day of December, A. D. 1884, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-half of one per cent on every dollar of the amount of the net yearly Income, Salaries, or receipts of all persons, partnerships and corporations, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City, in their valuation rolls of such Income, made, and only returned by them, on the ninth day of April, A.
