Coventry Diesel Marine Engine Gives Outstanding Performance in Alberton Fishing Boat

For the first time in over fifteen years an Alberton fishing boat is being equipped to drag for scallops on a recently discovered scallop bed about half way between Miminiegan and Shipigan, N.B.

Mr. Phillip Kinch sailed his new boat, which is equipped with a 30 H.P. diesel engine, the first of this type to be tried at Alberton South, yesterday, at a distance of 36 miles around North Cape to Miminiegan. Running at a cruising speed of five knots only five gallons of fuel oil took an estimated cost of ninety cents. The boat is slightly larger than a regular fishing boat and was built by Mr. William Aubrey, well known boat builder of Alberton South.
