Junior Game Goes Sunday

The first game in the finals of the Charlottetown and District Junior Hockey League will be staged at the Charlottetown Forum this Sunday afternoon with action scheduled to get underway at two o'clock.

Roger's Rangers, whom under the guiding hand of Norman 'Hawk' Larier, captured the junior league championship will face off against St. Dunstan's High School. The Saints finished second in the league standings, but were defeated in league play. Their second place finish was due to the fact that they inherited two losses from the St. Dunstan's Junior Varsity squad which was pulled out of the league in favor of the high school aggregation.

The Saints have a fast skating and well conditioned hockey club that is capable of playing a real good brand of junior hockey. They have the nucleus of last season's Legion Juvenile squad plus several members from their championship high school squad from the previous campaign.

The Rangers have a most capable leader in young Jamey Kennedy who has been scoring goals at a rapid clip in the local junior loop this season. The Rangers have several top notch junior performers and Jack MacEachern, their big left winger, will likely be attending a tryout camp with the Niagara Falls Flyers junior 'A' club come next fall. Jack is a big fast moving winger with a blistering shot.

We think that the local hockey fans who wend their way to the Fitzroy street 'ice palace', on Sunday afternoon will witness a good clean game of fast moving junior hockey.

Dineen Paces Canada To Win Over Finland

TAMPERE, Finland (CP)—A sparkling three-goal performance by centre Gary Dineen of Montreal gave Canada a hard-earned 4-0 victory over Finland Friday night as Toronto-born goalie Ken Broderick chalked up the first shutout of the world hockey championships.

Russia's defending champions and Sweden had a much easier time in winning their second straight games of the 11-day tournament. Russia followed up Thursday's 8-4 win over Finland with a 14-3 trouncing of Norway while Sweden crushed East Germany 5-1 in the other two championship round contests scheduled Friday.

Czechoslovakia and the United States had byes Friday.

Russia and Sweden were tied for first place, each with four points. Canada and Czechoslovakia, each with a game in hand, were deadlocked for third place with two points apiece.

These Finns held the Canadians scoreless for more than 19 minutes of the first period and with a little more finesse around the goalposts might have got a couple of goals.

Instead, Dineen grabbed the puck during a scramble at 19:45 and scored Canada's first goal unassisted.

Russia's smooth working visiting team led 3-0 in the first period, 7-1 in the middle frame and piled up four more in the final to the Regals singleton.

Played before close to four hundred fans the hard fought game was played on extremely soft ice and featured many sensational saves by both goal tenders.

MacArthur led the scoring parade for Tyne Valley with a grand total of five. E. Dymen and L. Ellis got a pair each and Gorrill a singleton.

Alberton's goals were credited to Allan Wallace and E. Matthews.

Braunstein Trips Arnet To Clinch Championship

SASKATOON (CP) — A perfectly executed five on the eighth end Friday afternoon carried Terry Braunstein and his Winnipeg rink to a 10-7 triumph over British Columbia to clinch the 1965 Canadian curling championship.

The Manitoba quartet needed the victory to prevent a deadlock with Saskatchewan, led by Harold Worth of Eelisle. Worth posted an 11-8 victory over the Prince Edward Island crew skipped by Doug Cameron of Charlottetown.

Braunstein turned down a free draw for six of the eighth end of the final round of the 11-team round-robin tournament but the five he accepted proved plenty.

Manitoba was trailing 4-3 when the entire rink-lead Ray Turnbull, second Ron Braun-

stein, third Don Duiguid and the skip — curled a perfect end. British Columbia's Jack Arnet crew from Vancouver committed five misses and the championship was settled, apart from the formality of completing the game.

"This is the ultimate for my rink and myself," said the young skip, who will lead the rink into the international curling championship at Perth, Scotland, March 15.

"We have to fill out our passports," he said. "We didn't do it before we got here."

WILL MISS TRIP  
Ron Braunstein will not make the trip. A medical student, he is unable to spare the time from his studies.

It was the second trip to the Canadian final for the Braunsteins and Turnbull, who forced 1958 champion Matt Baldwin of Edmonton to a playoff before bowing out.

Worth ended with an 8-3 record compared with the victors' 9-1. Nick Lasbuk's Alberta representatives from Calgary and the Jack Polyblank foursome from Kirkland Lake, representing Northern Ontario, tied for third place with 7-3 records.

Tied fifth were Ray Grant and his Ontario rink from Unionville and the Bill Tracy rink from Bagotville, representing Quebec.

Each had five wins and five defeats, compared with a 4-6 mark for Prince Edward Island's representatives, led by Doug Cameron of Charlottetown.

SHARE 7-3 RECORD  
Ron Franklin of Halifax led Nova Scotia to a 7-3 record that was equaled by the Arnet crew. Dr. Pete Lyons of Moncton steered New Brunswick into a last-place tie with the Newfoundland quartet headed by George MacCharles of St. John's.

Lasbuk downed Polyblank 9-8, MacCharles edged Lyons 9-8 in an extra end, and Grant rapped Tracy 13-7 in the final games of the competition.

Franklin drew the final bye. A crowd of about 4,800 watched the final round, boosting total paid attendance to 51,033. The record of 51,725 was set in Regina in 1955.

Polyblank handed Braunstein his only loss of the competition, a 12-6 whipping Thursday night to put Worth into a temporary tie and create the possibility of a playoff.

But Worth dropped back when he bowed 7-6 to Franklin in the 10th round.

In other 10th round games Polyblank tripped Tracy 8-6; Braunstein downed Grant 13-7; Lyons strapped Arnet 13-8 and Cameron pounded MacCharles 10-6.
