Speculation New Items May Be Election Date

The fact that Premier Walter R. Shaw will be appearing on television today has given rise to even more speculation that he will be calling an election this spring.

When asked yesterday morning if there would be any major announcements on the television program, the Premier, being quite elusive, replied, "all my announcements are major."

It is a standard practice of the Premier to make a report on television of the proceedings of the Legislative Assembly after it closes, but he hinted that there may be one or two new items he will talk about this evening. There has been for a number of weeks now a lot of speculation that the government would go to the country this spring. It began before the opening of the Legislative Assembly with the proclamation of the Election Act and the speculation picked up tempo with the government announcement that they would increase teacher's salaries. This was followed by an increase in the provincial civil servant's salaries.

The Throne Speech and the Budget were both thought by many observers to be election speeches.

This past week fuel has been added to the fires of speculation with a meeting on Wednesday night of the executive of the provincial Progressive Conservative Party believed to have been attended by the Premier, members of his cabinet, MLAs and nominated candidates.

On Thursday morning there was a cabinet meeting, normally the cabinet meets only on Tuesday. The Premier said that this meeting was to tidy up unfinished business left over from the Tuesday meeting. He did not say what the unfinished business was.

All this coupled with the news of the television broadcast at 7:10 Saturday evening has just about everyone saying there will be a spring election.

The date of the election is the one thing most pundits are not too sure of, but many are calling it for May 30 though they
