UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21. Executive Mansion, midnight—Dr. Royburn said, at a late hour to-night, that possibly an effort would be made in the morning to administer nourishment through the stomach.

WESTFIELD, Staten Island, Aug. 21. On receipt of the news concerning the unfavorable change in President Garfield's condition, a very exciting meeting was held.

DENVER, Aug. 20. The extensive rains of the past few days have caused heavy damage in this State, railroads being the heaviest sufferers.

BUFFALO, Aug. 21. The will of the widow of the late ex-President Millard Fillmore leaves public bequests to the amount of \$50,000, among which is \$20,000 to the University of Rochester.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21. There is a movement in this city, in which it is said many prominent capitalists are interested, for reviving the world's fair scheme and calling upon Judge Hilton to accept the presidency.

At the instance of detectives from this city, who have been following up for the past week a clue to the whereabouts of A. T. Stewart's body, workmen yesterday began excavations in Cypress Hill Cemetery.

CANON CITY, Col., Aug. 21. A terrible waterspout burst somewhere on Grape Creek, to-day, and at six o'clock last night whole sections of rail-way ties, with iron attached, were running in Arkansas River, together with bridge timbers, huge pine trees, cattle and horses.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Aug. 20. In the Commons, in committee of supply, last evening, after some discussion by the Home Rulers, the vote for Chief Secretary Forster's salary was agreed to.

The News says the immediate consequence of a rupture of the treaty negotiations with France will be the efforts of the foreign office to enter into closer commercial relations with Italy, Spain and Portugal.

The Standard says that Sir Erskine May, Speaker of the House of Commons, will, during recess, prepare suggestions for the improvement of the procedure of that body. Suggestions will be laid before the Cabinet prior to the opening of the session.

The Times' Dublin despatch says the popular organs express disappointment at the tone of Forster's and Gladstone's speeches during the debate on the Corcoran Act, on Wednesday, and echo the call made in Parliament for the release of the "suspects."

Mr. Herbert Gladstone in his speech at a meeting of electors at Leeds, last night, said: "One of the most satisfactory points in the foreign outlook is increasing friendship between England and America. If anything is more satisfactory than the outbreak of British sympathy with President Garfield it was the manner in which that outbreak was received in America."

The Observer says that ex-President Hayes, during his visit to England, will be the guest of Mr. Puelston, Member of Parliament.

LONDON, Aug. 22. Dillon, speaking at Thurles on Sunday, advised the people not to forget that the Government had insulted Father Sheehy and the rest of the "suspects" by imprisoning them. The Standard's despatch from Limerick says the military have been ordered to prepare a flying detachment to proceed to different parts of Limerick county at a moment's notice, as disturbances are anticipated.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

PARIS, Aug. 21. In the first division of Belleville, out of 8,904 votes cast, Gambetta obtained 4,515 and Lacour 2,536. In the second division Gambetta received 4,895 out of 10,046 and Lavy Revillon 4,516. Gambetta's absolute majority required for election was one vote. Up to the present time, 53 results are known, of which 46 are Republican, one Conservative and six second ballots necessary.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 20. The fall of the ministry of Hiaz Pasha is considered certain before the end of the present month.

GENEVA, Aug. 22.

A Dutch gentleman and two ladies of his family were killed by a land-slip on the road to Tete Noire, Switzerland.

TONIS, Aug. 21. The Arab fanatic, who "ran amuck" through the streets of Sussa on the 13th inst., was brought before the Bey yesterday, who had him hanged forthwith.

LONDON, Aug. 20. The Viceroy of India telegraphs that five of Ayobh Khan's regiments are encamped outside of Candahar. Ayobh Khan will follow. The destination of the forces is reported to be Jaladk.
