

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, Aug. 13.

In the Commons last night, Hon. Robert Bourke, replying to an interrogatory, stated that it was impossible for the Government to say where the Russian forces in Central Asia were stationed. The Government was quite willing to take the responsibility of sending a mission to Cabul, as it could not regard with indifference what had been passing in Central Asia during the last two months. Sir Stafford Northcote also pointed out that it was understood that England had a greater interest in Afghanistan than Russia had, and was therefore bound to send thither a mission of equal weight and influence with that of Russia.

Hon. Edward Stanhope, when introducing the Indian budget, gave the official estimate of the number of deaths from famine in India at 1,350,000.

It is stated that Mehemet Ali Pashi took ample orders to Bosnia to send the Turkish Roumelian troops to Dalmatia for embarkation to Constantinople.

The Sultan's ratification of the Treaty of Berlin has at last arrived.

Gen. Phillipovich and Grand Duke Wurtemberg have effected a junction marching on Serajevo, which it is believed the insurgents will evacuate.

It is reported that the insurgents have evacuated Senitza.

It has been ascertained that it was their main body which was defeated at Sheptche. The twentieth Austrian division was obliged to retreat, because the insurgents received large reinforcements. In consequence of this occurring close to the Servian frontier, a report is current that a corps will be sent to watch Servia, with orders to advance into the country at the first sign of bad faith.

BERLIN, Aug. 14.

The Papal Nuncio at Kissingen has been interviewed by a correspondent. The Nuncio merely expressed delight that the gulf between himself and Bismarck was not so wide as had been imagined.

LONDON, Aug. 14.

The Oldham Weavers have accepted the five per cent. reduction demanded by the masters.

RAGUSA, Aug. 14.

The Austrians have occupied Jubingle in Herzegovina. There are 5,000 insurgents at Slandola, south of Jubingle, and another body is near Bilek; 6,000 Turkish troops embarked for Valona, Albania, yesterday, on board three Austrian Steamers and escorted by two Austrian frigates.

LONDON, Aug. 14.

A Paris correspondent of the Times claims from unquestionable sources that Emperor Francis Joseph is much affected by the resistance offered to the Austrian occupation of the Turkish provinces. Resistance does not come from the Mussulmans alone. A revolutionary Pan Slavism is behind them, not with the hope of defeating the occupation, but to keep alive the disaffection which will attach Bosnia and Herzegovina to Serbia. Great focus of Pan Slav agitation. Servian government earnestly declares it is loyally adhering to its conventions with Austria, but this declaration is not implicitly believed in Vienna, where the feeling of irritation against Serbia is on the increase, hence the report which prevailed last night that an Austrian corps will be sent to watch Servia with orders to advance into that country at the first sign of bad faith.

LONDON, Aug. 14.

It is stated that since June 2nd, the date of the attempted assassination of Emperor William by Dr. Nobeling, there have been 563 arrests of persons in Germany for insulting the Emperor. Of this number, 521 have been convicted, including 31 women. The aggregate of sentences of imprisonment implied 811 years. Five of the accused committed suicide before their trial.

BERLIN, Aug. 14.

The recent elections in Alsace and Lorraine show an increase of moderate party and decrease of irreconcilables.

LONDON, Aug. 14.

In the House of Commons, to-day, the Territorial Waters Jurisdiction Bill passed its third reading.

VIENNA, Aug. 14.

It is stated that differences have arisen among insurgents at Livno Herzegovina and other points north of the River Marienta, causing the breaking up of several bands, the chiefs of which, accompanied by Hadji Lojr, are said to have fled into Albania.

BERLIN, Aug. 14.

A bill for the purpose of preventing the spread of Socialism has been submitted to the German Federal Council. It prohibits association meetings, and the publications in the furtherance of Socialistic or Communistic objects. The central authorities of Federal States are declared competent to deal with all offences against this law. Any appeal from their decisions will be to the Imperial Bureau to be created for the purpose of considering questions concerning public meetings; and press penalties range from a fine to a year's imprisonment. Socialistic agents may be expelled from towns and forbidden to pursue their trades as printers, booksellers or inn-keepers. The central authorities may, with the sanction of the Federal Council in the Districts where public safety is endangered, prohibit public meetings for a year, unless the meetings are sanctioned by the police authorities; to prohibit the sale of interdicted printed matter in the streets; restrict the sale or possession of arms, and expel unemployed persons.

The Mail says: "As sure as we are of anything human, we are sure that the general election is going to reverse the state of parties in the Dominion, and we base this certainty of assurance on the testimony of shrewd men and experienced politicians in every Province of the Confederation, as well as on our observation."

ANOTHER BLOODY AFFAIR.

Three Men Shot at Nine Mile Creek.

THE SUPPOSED CRIMINAL CAPTURED.

ON Wednesday night (the night of the Kelly murder) there was a shooting affray at Seven Mile Bay Three men were shot. One (George Clarke) was seriously, perhaps fatally, injured. The injuries received by the other two (Frank Holland and Johnson Irving) were light. A man named Mayhew has been arrested—charged with the crime. It is said the men shot were stealing fruit.

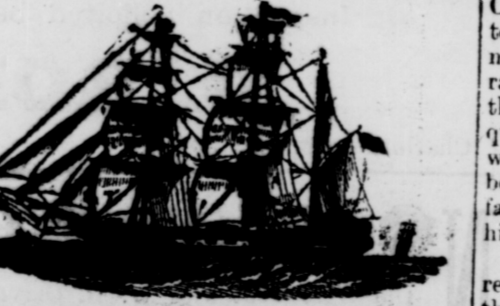
