SPORT FROM BRITAIN

Fired For Policy, His All-Canadian Teams Are Winners

By JACK SULLIVAN Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO (CP) — Eight years ago Toronto Argonauts fired Coach Teddy Morris because he wouldn't bend to the trend toward importing American football players. Teddy had unbounded faith in Canadian talent and for good reason—his all-Canadian teams had won three straight Grey Cups for him.

That was in an era when the Joe Krots and Royal Copelands carried the mail for Argonauts. The firing didn't bother the 165-pound halfback who played nine years with Argonauts, helped them win three Grey Cup Titles as a player (1933-37-38) and three as a coach (1945-6-7). He retired to his 200-acre Toronto suburban farm and obscurity, fattening up lambs in the winter and selling them in the spring. Teddy worked the farm himself and didn't have much time to think of football.

IN THE MONEY Then he struck it rich. The Dominion government needed airport property and 100 of Morris' 200 acres suited. Teddy sold for

enough to keep his wife and two children comfortably for life. A few weeks ago 46-year-old Teddy was lured from his lambs and horses to find players for his old team, as chief scout for Canadian talent.

Someone had to swallow pride. "I had no reason to say no when Lew (Lew Hayman, Argonaut general manager) asked me to help the club as scout. Mind you, I don't need the job, but Lew is a good guy to work with," Hayman coached Argonauts through most of Morris' playing days from 1931 to 1939.

Teddy's old football pals didn't forget him when he took the job. They tipped him on likely prospects and Morris is chasing every lead.

HE'S OPTIMISTIC "Maybe I can steer about 30 youngsters to our clinic in the summer," Teddy says. "If we can get two or three who can help the team immediately or in the future, I'll be happy."

Morris still has definite ideas about the part Canadians can play in big-league football. "The trouble is the Canadian player automatically seems to think he has to play second fiddle to an import. That's all wrong. Our boys have the opportunity to make Americans sweat it out on the bench and they can do it. They have the same potential as imports." He conceded that some American specialists as quarterbacks and pass-catching ends have advantages over the Canadian but "only because the American spend more time on detail."

PRACTICE COUNTS "Our boys could practise more. They should get out in the spring and work at the job."

Morris doesn't go along with the notion that American coaches use Canadian players at the injury-inviting safety position on punt returns because they are expendable. "The Americans don't attach the same importance to this job as we do," he says. "Remember, the Canadian boy is drilled more on this assignment and its one department where Canadians excel."

Morris had a glittering career as a player. He was selected to Canadian Press Big Four all-star teams in 1933-34-35-36-38 and won the Jeff Russell trophy in 1937 as the most valuable player to his team.

Now he's back at the old stand. The homespun fellow with the cowlick and work-hardened hands should be a popular figure with Argonaut fans.
