Four Mishaps Are Reported

MONTAGUE — Montague detachment RCMP are investigating four accidents which occurred in their area in the past few days. One at Brudenell on Sunday night at 10:30 p.m. causing approximately \$150 damage. It is reported to have happened when a car driven by Leo Gerald Jamieson went out of control and rolled into the ditch. There were two passengers in the car at the time but none were reported as seriously hurt. Yesterday morning five persons were rushed to the Kings County Memorial Hospital for treatment as the result of an accident near Bridgetown. Taken to hospital was Garry Blair MacKinnon, driver of one of the vehicles and his passengers Oswald Scofield, Marion MacLeod, and his mother Marion MacKinnon. They were in a 1964 Ford which was said to be completely destroyed. The driver of the second vehicle was Alfred Crane which was a 1/2 ton 1958 truck. Crane was also taken to hospital. Damage to the truck was said to be about \$300. It has been reported that none were seriously injured. Montague detachment RCMP are also investigating an accident at Flat River which occurred on Monday, but investigation is continuing on this accident and details were not available. Another accident occurred in Montague when a Honda was in collision with a dog. Barry Campbell of Montague was rushed to the Kings County Hospital for treatment to arms and legs. A young lady was riding on the vehicle at the time but it is reported she was unhurt.

FARMERS

Oxford County, said in an interview the farmers are not seeking a dairy subsidy, but are "after money." It has been the farmers' contention that the processors who buy their manufacturing-grade milk took part of a recently granted federal subsidy in higher transportation costs charged against the producer. Milk producers now are paid a guaranteed \$3.75 a hundredweight for manufacturing-grade milk. The federal subsidy of 25 cents raises this to \$4, the amount asked by the farmers. But the farmers say they have to pay as much as 30 cents a hundredweight for transportation to the processor. They want \$4 paid at the farm.

Annual Meeting Set For Today

London Rejects Peking Charges

LONDON (AP) — Government officials Tuesday night rejected Peking charges that Britain is helping the American war effort in Viet Nam with a military airlift and with base facilities in Hong Kong. Defence ministry authorities said some medium-range RAF planes are using Saigon, South Viet Nam, as a staging point for flights between Singapore and Hong Kong, but they carry no military supplies for American forces in Viet Nam. The Chinese charges, published in the Peking People's Daily Monday, formed part of Minister Wilson's stand on Viet Nam and particularly for his support of U.S. President Johnson's objectives. An article claimed: 1. British officers are active in Saigon. 2. RAF planes are carrying military supplies to American troops in Viet Nam. 3. The colony of Hong Kong off the Chinese mainland, has been opened as a base for the Americans. In denying the accusations, defence ministry men said the only British officers in Saigon are those attached to the British embassy's normal military mission and to a police training mission.

Two Mishaps Are Reported

City Police reported two accidents here yesterday. The first accident occurred at 4:55 p.m. at the corner of Weymouth and Kent Street. The vehicles involved were a 1964 Valiant driven by Lucy Maud Sims, Kensington and a 1966 Pontiac driven by Calvin Russell, Sherwood. Approximately \$300 damage was reported. The second accident was at 8:20 last evening on Queen Street. A 1964 Mercury reportedly driven by Gerald Herbert, Shediac, N.B., collided with a 1957 Chevrolet driven by Louis Hynes, Charlottetown RR 2. There was no estimate of damage available. Police stated that no injuries were reported in either accident.

Guyana Bank Boosts Rate

GEORGETOWN, Guyana (CP) — The Bank of Guyana Tuesday increased to 6 1/2 per cent from six per cent its yearly interest rate for rediscounting eligible paper and for granting loans and advances to banks. Dr. Horst Bockelman, governor of the central financial institution, said the change had been made with a view to preserving Guyana's foreign exchange position, particularly not to disturb favorable development of a local market for short-term securities. The market requires competitive interest rates, as against the London money market.

Wildlife Expert Expresses Views

HALIFAX (CP) — A Florida wildlife expert said Tuesday a snake which escaped last week in Prince Edward Island probably is already dead. Frank Weed of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., who travels in the Maritimes exhibiting a private collection of Florida snakes, animals and birds, also denied reports the snake was a Boa constrictor. "It was a four-lined rat snake or chicken snake, about 4 1/2 feet long and completely harmless," he said in an interview. Mr. Weed, who once owned the missing snake, said it would perish in the first chill of 40-45 degrees. The snake, named Charley and owned by Warren Duchemin of Stanhope, P.E.I., escaped last Wednesday.

Lennox Island Resident Is Remanded Without Bail

SUMMERSIDE — Hardy Melvin Labobe, Lennox Island, was charged with the indecent assault of a female in Prince County court here yesterday morning and remanded to August 2 in custody without bail. Labobe pleaded guilty to a charge of damaging private property to an extent of less than \$50 and was sentenced to 30 days in Prince County jail by presiding Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald. James Emmett Labobe, Lennox Island, pleaded guilty to indecently assaulting a male person and was remanded to August 2 for sentencing. Eric George Inman, Alberton, South, was sentenced to three months in jail for theft of a liquor permit. The magistrate said the accused had appeared frequently before the court in the past and his record made the sentence necessary.
