THE RIEL REBELLION  
RIEL'S CAPTURE.  
A WILLING CAPTIVE!  
FURTHER PARTICULARS.

CLARKE'S CROSSING, May 17.  
Another account of the capture of Riel says that Riel was captured by three scouts, named Armstrong, Diehl and Howie, four miles north of Batoche. The scouts had been out in the morning to scour the country; but these three had spread from the main body, and just as they were coming out of some bushes, on an unfrequented trail, they spied Riel with three companions. He was unarmed, but his companions carried shot-guns. They at once recognized Riel, and advancing towards him, hailed him by name. No effort was made on his part to escape, and after a brief conversation, in which they expressed surprise at finding him, Riel declared that he had intended to give himself up. His only fear was, he said, that he would be shot by the troops. He was promised a safe escort to the General's quarters. Riel was not in the least agitated when arrested, and was willingly made captive. He was assured of a fair trial, which was all he seemed to want.

Now they have him—How are they to Dispose of Him?

Chief Justice Wallbridge's Opinion.  
WINNIPEG, May 18.  
Chief Justice Wallbridge has given the opinion that according to law, Riel must be tried in the District of Saskatchewan where he was captured. He could not be brought to Winnipeg or Ottawa. The Dominion Government might, however, issue a special commission and send up judges to try him under the present act. The judicial authorities in Saskatchewan have power to try a man for his life, but an appeal to the Manitoba Bench is provided for. He could not be tried by court martial under the circumstances. Gen. Middleton, it will be remembered, promised in a letter to Riel that he would be protected until the Dominion Government decided on his case.

What Riel Says.

BATOUCHE, May 17.  
Riel is reported as having expressed himself to this effect:  
"I do not think this trouble will be without result, as complaints of farmers will now be regarded with some degree of attention."  
When told that his books and papers had been captured, he said:  
"I am glad of this. The papers will show that I am not the actual leader of the rebellion. I have been encouraged by people of good standing at Prince Albert who invited me from Montana."  
He expresses great anxiety to know whether or not he will be tried by civil law or Court Marshal. He seems to have turned out a craven coward and spends his time alternately praying and embracing the cross.

Never be Taken Alive.

WINNIPEG, May 18.  
It is reported here that Gabriel Dumont fought like a tiger at Batoche, and declared he would never be taken alive.

POUNDMAKER'S LAST STRONGHOLD.

BATTLEFORD, May 18.  
Ross and his scouts have just arrived here, and report that the Indians started from Cut Knife on the 13th inst. The scouts camped on Saturday night where the Indians did the previous night. The Indians' trail was half mile broad, and all along the way, carcasses of dead cattle dotted the prairie. The Indians are travelling at the greatest possible speed. It was an Indian advance guard which captured the wagon train a few days ago. A courier just in reports having heard of another train being captured to-day. A very large force of hostile Indians are encamped about Sounding Lake, and it is believed that Poundmaker has established himself at Eagle Hills, where a final effort at resistance to the militiamen will be made.

A Carnival of Murder.

PANAMA, May 17.  
A perfect carnival of murder, took place near here recently. A party of Columbian soldiers and Carthaginians made a midnight attack on a body of American and Jamaicans, killing eighteen outright and wounding twenty others, many of whom have since died.

Shipping Disasters.

HALIFAX, May 18.  
The Norwegian barque Magdalena, from Tron for Quebec, struck ice on the 6th of May, off the Banks of Newfoundland, and sunk. One man refused to leave the sinking vessel, and went down with her. The others, fourteen in number, took to the boats. They were two days and nights, and were then rescued and brought to Halifax.

Middleton on the March.

TORONTO, May 18.  
Advice from Batoche to the papers here state that Gen. Middleton's columns have commenced their march for the relief of Prince Albert.

HALIFAX, May 18.  
The strike of the doctors attending the Halifax Hospital still continues, and one hundred patients are without experienced medical attendance. Dr. Ross has retired from the position of Principal of Dalhousie College (after a quarter of a century's service) on a pension of one thousand dollars a year.
